After graduating from South Dakota University in 1960, I worked with my Dad in a small oil distributing company in Sioux Falls. I was interested in federal law enforcement and after passing the entrance exam and extensive background check, I entered the U.S. Secret Service in 1965 in the Oklahoma City field office. The USSS has field offices in every major U.S. city. It was then a division of the Treasury Department and created in 1865 to

On a recent visit to Norway I was able to reconnect to members of my family near Oslo and further up the coast at Trondheim. We visited the places where my grandparents had lived before immigrating to the USA in the 1800s and homesteading in the Dakotas.

The picture is on board the Hurtigruten, which traverses the entire coast of Norway, wending its way in and out of fjords, sometimes 200 miles long. Another highpoint was a 13-mile ride on the Flåm Railway, which originates in the mountain town of Myrdal and dives down the mountainside past amazing waterfalls to the fjord

below. The other picture was taken at the Elephant Farm outside Chaing Mai, a major veterinary center for these incredible creatures.

I was speaking to another friend from Murdo, South Dakota recently and I'm sure I borrowed this from somewhere and paraphrase it now, "You can take a boy out of South Dakota, but you can't take South Dakota out of the boy." Of course gender could easily be switched in that line. I will always have a strong connection to the Midwestern prairie and the beautiful city of Sioux Falls. It was wonderful being able to connect with some of my classmates at our 50th Reunion. Unfortunately we will not be able to attend the 55th as we will be attending Bob's 50th in Hutchinson, Kansas. BROWN continued from page 1 suppress the counterfeiting of our currency. Subsequently, protection of the President and Vice President became the primary responsibility of USSS. This was later extended to former Presidents and their spouses, visiting heads of state and serious candidates for the U.S. presidency. Additional duties of the USSS field offices are investigations of forged US Treasure checks, bonds and other security obligations of the United States. During my first year, I worked criminal cases with senior agents and attended 3 six week training

schools. From 1966-1970, I was assigned to the Presidential Protection Division at the White House during the administrations of Presidents Johnson and Nixon.

In 1970, I was transferred to the Dallas field office and in 1974; I became resident agent of the Lubbock, Texas office. During my 8 years in Texas, I worked criminal investigations and many times was temporarily assigned to protective details of the President, Vice President, foreign dignitaries and presidential candidates during election campaigns. In 1978, I was reassigned to the former President

Ford Protective Division in California as Assistant Agent in charge and traveled extensively with him for seven years. In 1986, I was transferred to our Los Angeles field office as Assistant to the Special Agent in Charge. It is the second largest field office in the US Secret Service and is comprised of several investigative units. I was in charge of one of the squads until my retirement in 1987.

In 22 years with the Secret Service, I traveled in physical protection and conducted advance surveys for our protectees both domestically and in Europe, Middle East, Africa, Asia, Australia and South America. In total, I worked about twelve years in protection and ten years in criminal investigation.

Needless to say, we had incredible experiences over 22 years. At the time, I didn't give it a lot of thought as we all did what we were trained for but now I realize it was a crucial and sometime turbulent time in our history. Through it all, my wife Karen, (Gurley) and I raised 3 great sons and she carried on taking good care of us all. I have many former agent friends throughout the U.S. and I'm especially proud and privileged to have been a part of the US Secret Service.

After retiring on a Friday, I started the following Monday in 1987, to embark on an 11 year career with Master Card

Previously, I had some experiences in card fraud as the Secret Service added a new federal jurisdiction regarding credit card fraud in 1984. I retired from Master Card International in 1998 as Vice President of Security and Risk Management in San Ramon, California. It was a great company to be associated with and I have been fortunate to have had two great careers.






Right; Agent Brown (2nd from right) providing crowd control for President Nixon on 1969 Guam trip.






