Callison: Experienced Warriors wanted

WHS reunion prompts search for oldest living grad, teacher <u>JILL CALLISON</u> • ARGUS LEADER • JANUARY 5, 2010

After nearly a century of use, the stairs at Washington High School had developed grooves from the thousands of students who had climbed them. Those grooves are gone now, and the building no longer is used as a school. But thousands of graduates and former faculty and staff still retain an unbreakable tie to the Sioux quartzite building that faces Main Street. Their memories are fostered by Alumni Hall in what is now the Washington Pavilion's third floor west wing, which displays trophies, band uniforms, photographs and a typical classroom. Another chance to look back will come this summer at the All-Class Reunion on June 25-27. Before the reunion, the Alumni Hall Committee, made up of alumni and former teachers, is seeking the oldest graduate and oldest faculty member.

Two contenders for those titles still live in Sioux Falls. Fred Claudon served as a teacher and guidance counselor from 1964 until 1981, and Norma DeGroot graduated from Washington in 1932. DeGroot was known as Norma Studer when she began walking from her house at Seventh Street and Nesmith Avenue to the high school downtown. She will celebrate her 96th birthday April 6. She had attended Whittier, the first junior high school in Sioux Falls, and Whittier kids didn't begin at Washington until their sophomore year. "I had to walk across the Sioux River, and when the temperature was terribly cold, I tried to stop in some place to warm up a little bit," she recalls. "It was a long walk, but we didn't think anything of it. We walked, and that's the way we got there." In fact, with a noon lunch hour, DeGroot sometimes returned home for a quick lunch. Otherwise, she brought a sandwich or spent 10 cents for a bun at a downtown bakery.

DeGroot played basketball in high school, although "I don't know that we had a real team like they have now," she says. "I really just played for fun." In DeGroot's yearbook, then called the Monograph, 298 students are pictured. She is shown in a profile with the quote "A precious jewel is constancy" under her name.

DeGroot spent the summer after high school living with an aunt and uncle in Chicago and served as the vacation relief girl for a grocery store. But she decided to return to Sioux Falls and was employed with John Morrell & Co., working both in sausage production and in the store and employment office. After her marriage to Abe DeGroot, the couple had two children, both of whom graduated from Washington High School.

Claudon and his wife also had two children, but they attended Lincoln High School. That sometimes put Claudon in a tricky situation as a parent. He recalls one year when Washington and Lincoln were playing in the basketball sectionals to see which would advance to the state tournament. Claudon not only attended the game, he made the announcements on the public address system for Washington. Washington defeated Lincoln that night, advancing to state with a three-point victory. "When I came home, Jeannie was standing in the middle of the floor," Claudon says, referring to his older daughter. "She said, 'I hope you're satisfied,' and I said, 'Yeah, Jeannie, I am. My team won, your team lost.' "Her response: "Here I am, a senior in high school, and the tournament is out in Rapid City, and I don't even get to go."

When Claudon started at Washington, it was with the understanding that he would be there a year, then would transfer to Lincoln High School when it opened.

His first year, Washington students attended classes a half-day in the building, with Lincoln students there the other half-day. When Lincoln's building opened, its principal had someone else in mind for Claudon's slot. But he didn't mind. Washington's principal, Ben Rossow, said, "We'd be glad to have you at Washington," and he stayed. "I had settled into Washington real well, and I thought a lot of Washington," Claudon says. Most of the instructors and staff members felt that loyalty, he says, including a teacher named Annie Kleinsasser.

When the Claudons moved from Sioux Falls to Aberdeen, they bought a house in the Lincoln district, thinking it would be closer for everyone. But Claudon, now 92, found himself traveling downtown for 17 years. "Annie Kleinsasser always used to tell me, go to the IPC and tell them you want your kids to go to Washington," he says, referring to the school district office. "I'd say, 'No, Annie, they can go to Lincoln." Claudon had taught journalism and English, but he switched to guidance counseling when South Dakota established a requirement. He thought he could be closer to the students that way. "I really got to know the kids at Washington. My office was full of kids all the time," Claudon says. "One time, someone said to me, 'If the kids would stay out of here, I could get my work done.' I said, 'If the kids would stay out of wouldn't have work t o do.' a n y here, y o u



Hoover Dam Bypass **Bridge:** I just have to show you the new bridge being constructed to by pass Hoover Dam just 30 minutes from Las Vegas. South bound highway traffic out of Las Vegas has always traveled across the top of Hoover Dam. But because of 9-11, the danger of a terrorists attack to the dam has been too great, thus this new magnificent \$160 million bridge 900 feet above the mighty Colorado River to bypass the dam. In an incredible feat of engineering, the road will be supported on the two massive concrete arches which jut out of the

The arches are made up of 53 individual sections each 24 feet long which have been cast on-site and are being lifted into place using an improvised high-wire crane strung between temporary steel pylons. The arches will eventually measure more than 1,000 feet across. At the moment, the structure looks like a traditional suspension bridge. But once the arches are complete, the suspending cables on each side will be removed. Extra vertical columns will then be installed on the arches to carry the road.
