

Jack, I can't imagine getting, let alone reading, 200 emails every day. My hat's off to you for your effort and many alumni thanks. Since you were looking for stories, I thought I would share mine since it is one few, if any, 50's decade have experienced. In fact if there are any out there that have had a heart transplant, I would like to hear from them at dickmkelly@yahoo.com.

In 2004, just two months after pedaling the 109 Mickelson Trail from Hot Springs to Deadwood over three days, I was diagnosed with Congestive Heart Failure (CHF), cause unknown. In spring of 2005 after the legislative session, I had a pacemaker/defib implanted. By summer of 2010 my condition had worsened to the point my cardiologist suggested I go to Fairview/University of Minnesota for an evaluation. Arriving there in late July for an evaluation, I was immediately put in the hospital and a week later had open heart surgery to implant a Left Ventricular Assist Device (LVAD) as a bridge to transplant. For the next year I would wear a controller and two batteries plus carrying a back-up in a bag (in case of failure). At

night I was plugged into the house current. Let me tell you, it was a very uncomfortable year, but it was keeping me alive and somewhat mobile. I was also put on the heart transplant list as a One B which meant there were many others ahead of me in the region. Only Mayo, Fairview, and Abbott do heart transplant in the SD, ND, and MN region. At my appointment in Minneapolis in June of 2011, Dr. Masri put me back on the One A status, which was the most critical condition. At 2 AM on July 16, I received a call from the transplant coordinator at Fairview and she said "we have a heart for you". I woke my wife, Mary, and the house went nuts. She woke our son who was temporarily residing here, and called our daughter and another son. I might say I was very calm amidst all the excitement. Since they wanted me up there within a couple of hours, Mary and I jumped (walked slowly) on the Sanford air ambulance and pulled up to the ER at Fairview at 4:30 AM. I was admitted and then had to wait 12 hours until they were able to recover the Donor heart. What a wonderful legacy for someone to leave.

The surgery lasted 12 hours and the next 24 hours were the most critical. But everything went well, I suffered no pain and 10 days later Dr. Masri released me to go back to Sioux Falls on the condition I don't drive and return every week for a heart cath and biopsy. I made about 10 trips to Minneapolis over the 5 months and continue now on a bi-monthly basis. I was back to work at my County Commissioner duties by late August and feeling much better. I am back to where I was 6-7 years ago, doing yard work, walking, and working and totally enjoying **my second chance for life**. I have met other LVAD and transplant recipients in this area. There are only 2,400 heart transplants done in the US each year, but the demand is much, much greater. If you are not marked as a donor on your drivers license now I encourage you to do so. Even at our age, many lives can be saved by the gift of many organs other than the heart. One person can save over 40 others with life-threatening issues. The insurance coverage I received through Medicare, Wellmark supplemental, and Part D was excellent. And I cannot begin to thank God enough for the blessings He has given me and my family through the work of his surgeons hands and my rapid and complete recovery. Our medical system in this country is not broken.

I apologize for the length of this, it's hard to be concise.

Keep up the good work keeping our classes informed.

Gary submitted this story on he and his son, Terry's, participation in the annual Palm Springs Fly In. Gary has always stayed very active in his love for aviation.

For the third year in a row, my son, Terry Norbraten, and I attended the Palm Springs (California) Air Museum's T34 "Mentor" fly-in. Terry flew a "B" model Mentor out of the Monterey Navy Flying Club to Gillespie Field, El Cajon, California, where we were joined by several other pilots and their planes and flew in a loose formation to Palm Springs, arriving the afternoon of March 20th.

All told, we had 11 Mentors participating from California and Arizona, including a contingent from the flying club of the old March Air Force Base near Riverside.

On Saturday, we could squeeze in only two morning performances because, by mid-day, the winds had kicked up so much that our flight leader cancelled flights until Sunday.

On Sunday, we did three performances for the museum patrons, including formation flying with low passes over the runway.

My job was to sit in the back of our plane, fully restrained by lap and shoulder harness, and attempt not to bang my head on the canopy as the winds bounced us up and down.

If anyone is in the vicinity of Palm Springs next year, it's a great show to view, and the museum has excellent displays of aircraft and other static displays, many from World War II.




Jack - Once again, my thanks to you for taking the time and effort to make it possible for us to remember those that have passed.....we might not have had any of this information without your efforts.



Deceased Classmates Listed On Multiple Class Lists.

EDITOR'S NOTE: As maybe most of you know, twice a year I publish 10 updated deceased lists, one for each WHS class from 1950 through 1959. The first publication date is always on Memorial Day and the second is at Christmas. Immediately after the publication of these lists I always receive several nice letters from classmates pointing out that some deceased classmates are listed on more than one class list. Below is a typical response letter that I write to each person that contacts me on the subject. I am sure many more of you have noticed the duplication, but just have not gotten around to writing, so I am publishing this response letter to try and explain why it happens and the reason I think it is proper to list some classmates with two classes. Thanks for you letter pointing out that (<u>classmate's name</u>) is listed on two different class's deceased list. When I first started publishing the Alumni version of the Orange and Black for the '50s decade I ran into several issues that required decisions to be made on how those issues would be handled. As always, some solutions were simpler than others to solve.

This issue of confusion and uncertainty about which class year someone belonged in was one of the more difficult issues to decide on the best way to handle it. And, the problem was arising among a surprisingly significant number of classmates. I considered the problem for a long time and even consulted classmates of many of those people in question for second opinions.

The original case that came up was sort of the "landmark case" and it helped me set the policy. It involved a fairly good friend of mine, Fred Sykes, from the class of '53 and my class of '54. I, and I think everyone who knew Fred, knew he was definitely in the class of '53. His senior photo even appeared with the senior class in the 1953 yearbook. But for some reason, Fred did not graduate with the class of '53, he graduated with my class of '54. He is listed in our class of '54 Commencement Program and as a result his name has always been included as a member of the 1954 class.

I assure you, I thought a great deal about how to handle this type of scenario. I knew there would be other similar situations in the 10 years of deceased lists that I try to maintain. And sure enough there has been. Ray Syverson, another friend of mine, is another perfect example. Ray was definitely a member of the 1955 class and I think he will always be considered a member of the class of '55 by the majority of his friends and classmates. But Ray actually graduated a year later with the class of '56.

You also mentioned Jerry Hagen in your letter. Jerry is another perfect example. He is pictured with the seniors in the 1956 yearbook so I would think that he was really a member of that class during his first 4 years of high school. But he evidently didn't graduate in '56 and was then listed under, "Seniors Without Pictures", in the 1957 yearbook. I would bet that his name would appear with the class of '57 in the 1957 Commencement Program.

Therefore, after considering the situation long and hard I came to the decision that the safest and the best solution was to list them with both classes. I just don't think I have the right to decide which class Jerry, or the others should be listed with and ignore his association with their other class. Listing them with both classes causes no harm that I can see. And if for example, a friend of Rays from with the class of '55 should only read the '55 deceased list and another friend from the class of '56 should only read the class of '56 list, I want them both to know of Ray's sad and very untimely passing.

I hope this explains the overall problem, the reason for the policy I have adopted on the matter and why you will continue to see some people listed with two classes. If you have any further questions or comments, of course I will be glad to discuss them with you.



On July 30, 2012, Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta appointed Mike Rich, Class of '57, along with 14 other distinguished citizens to the Defense Legal Policy Board, which was established in April of this year to provide the Secretary with informed, independent advice on legal issues related to the Department of Defense. Other members of the board include "Ike" Skelton, former Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, two former U.S. Deputy Attorney Generals, two former

Department of Defense General Counsels and seven retired flag officers besides Mike who is a retired brigadier general in the Marine Corps and is currently an assistant United States Attorney in Virginia specializing in the prosecution of violent crimes.

The first task assigned the Board by the Secretary is to review the application of military justice in Afghanistan going back to October 2001 in connection with instances where service members are alleged to have committed offenses against civilians. The Board's report is due to the Secretary by March 31, 2013.
