A Salute To WHS Class of 1951

The class of 1951 is being featured in this issue of the O&B in hopes of attracting more Orange & Black subscribers from the class of '51 and thus hopefully increasing the number of articles being submitted from this truly great class. Of the 10 class years of the fifties decade, the class of '51 currently holds the distinction of having the smallest number of subscribers to the Orange & Black and that probably explains the relatively few class of '51 news items being submitted to the O&B.

Awhile back I had the real pleasure of speaking to Charles Gerlinger from the class of '51. It was a conversation I thoroughly enjoyed and it seemed clear that Charles truly enjoys reading the O&B. He, like most all of my subscribers had just one request. He would like to see more stories on his beloved class of '51. I told him that I am pretty limited to publishing stories and photographs that are submitted to me and since there were so few members of the class of '51 that receive the O&B it was unlikely that items relating to his class would be increasing.

After hanging up from that phone conversation I felt like I disappointed Charles and did not give him the answer he had hoped for. So for the first time ever I am soliciting subscribers to the O&B and primarily from the class of '51. My theory is that the more subscribers the O&B has from a class, the more news and photos will be submitted on that class. So, I am making a special plea for your help to increase the number of subscribers from the class of 1951. But of course, more subscribers from all classes are always welcome.

In case you might be interested, the O&B is now mailed to just over 600 addresses. A little over 700 WHS Alumni are reached at those 600 addresses due to both spouses being from WHS. About 200 O&B subscribers come from my class of 1954. The class of 1955 is in 2nd place with 69 subscribers. It is interesting that the O&B now has 50 WHS Alumni subscribers from outside the fifties decade. Subscribers now range from the class of 1943 to 1989. There seems to be ample evidence that the more subscribers from a class, the greater number of stories will be submitted on their class.

So if you want more articles and photographs on your class, just encourage more O&B readers.

To begin **The Orange & Black's Salute To The WHS Class of '51** I thought it only appropriate to feature a member of the class and after my delightful conversations with Charles Gerlinger, I felt he was the obvious and perfect choice. Getting Charles to agree was entirely a different matter. I quickly learned that Charles is a very laid back and low profile kind of guy who seems to prefer shying away from publicity and attention. When I told him of my wishes to write a brief story on his life and career since WHS, he immediately and gracefully declined, even suggesting other names from his class that he thought would be better choices.

Obviously, I didn't agree and persisted, urging and encouraging his reluctant cooperation. Eventually I was able to piece together the following on Charles from our conversations and my Internet research.

For those of you who knew Charles in high school will probably recall him being very active in school activities. The 1951 Warrior listed the following clubs and activities after his senior yearbook photo: *"College Club, Science, IRC, Hi-Y, Secretary of Hi-Y Cabinet, Vice President of NHS, NFL, President of Pawn Pushers, Boys' State, Debate, Declam, Head Monitor, Jr. Kiwanian"*.

Charles explained to me the reasons that drew him to the East coast. For example, the reason he went to Princeton was because his father, who was the minister of the Congregational Church in Sioux Falls, had gone to the Princeton Theological Seminary to prepare for the ministry (although he grew up Bemidji in the far North of Minnesota). Charles had visited Princeton while a boy and he suspects that the possibility of going there was probably planted in his mind by that visit. By the time he graduated from Princeton, all three of his sisters were living in the East so his father and mother, in about 1957 (after being in Sioux Falls for about 25

years), left Sioux Falls for western Connecticut to be closer to them. His father had two small Congregational churches in CT. Charles felt all of that might help explain why his focus was on the East coast and why he didn't come back to Sioux Falls later except for a visit. The Gerlinger's currently reside in Boston.



Charles & Renate Gerlinger

1. Charles, graduated from Washington High School in 1951.
2. Graduated from Princeton University in 1955 with an A.B. degree. His major was in the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs which is a bridge department that allowed students to take courses in the History, Politics and Economics Departments.
3. Graduated with an L.L.B. degree from the University of Michigan Law School in 1958 with special emphasis on antitrust law courses.
4. Admitted to the Michigan Bar in 1958.
5. Employed by the Federal Trade Commission from the summer of 1958 through early 1962. Worked in the Litigation Department in Washington D.C. on cases involving unfair trade practices and antitrust cases.
6. Married Renate in June 1961. Her home was Hannover, Germany.
7. Renate and Charles moved to St. Joseph, Michigan in 1962 when he took a job in the Legal Department of Whirlpool Corporation. Renate worked at the Heath Company.
8. In 1965, they moved to Boston where he obtained a job in the Legal Department of USM Corporation (previously known as United Shoe Machinery Corporation, a company that had been founded in the 19th century and was well known in Boston). There Charles worked on several acquisitions and two court cases among many other duties. He was also an Assistant Treasurer.
9. Obtained a Master of Business Administration degree from Boston University in 1974.
10. In 1977, after USM was acquired by another company and its offices were moved to Connecticut, Charles left USM and took a job with Cabot Corporation, another company that had been founded in the 19th century and was and is well known in Boston. In Cabot's Legal Department, he worked on matters involving Human Resources, Finance, and corporate secretarial matters including filings the company made with the Securities and Exchange Commission. In the late 1980s he became Cabot's Corporate Secretary and also held the title of Senior Corporate Counsel. He retired from Cabot in 1996 but continued to provide consulting assistance to them until shortly after the turn of the century.
11. Since retiring he has been a member of the Board of Trustees of their condominium association and served from 2007 through 2009 on the Board of Directors of the Hospice and Palliative Care of Cape Cod Inc.
12. Renate and Charles do not have any children but as Charles said, "Perhaps because of that we were able to travel a fair amount." Charles told me that he and Renate have been able to visit most countries in Europe, Turkey, Japan, China, New Zealand, Australia, and Peru. His work also required him to travel sometimes. Over a period of time, he was able to visit Brazil, Argentina, Japan, and the Czech Republic. In Boston, the seemingly very happy couple, are able to enjoy attending the Boston Symphony, the Boston Ballet, the Huntington Repertory Theater and presentations by various public speakers.

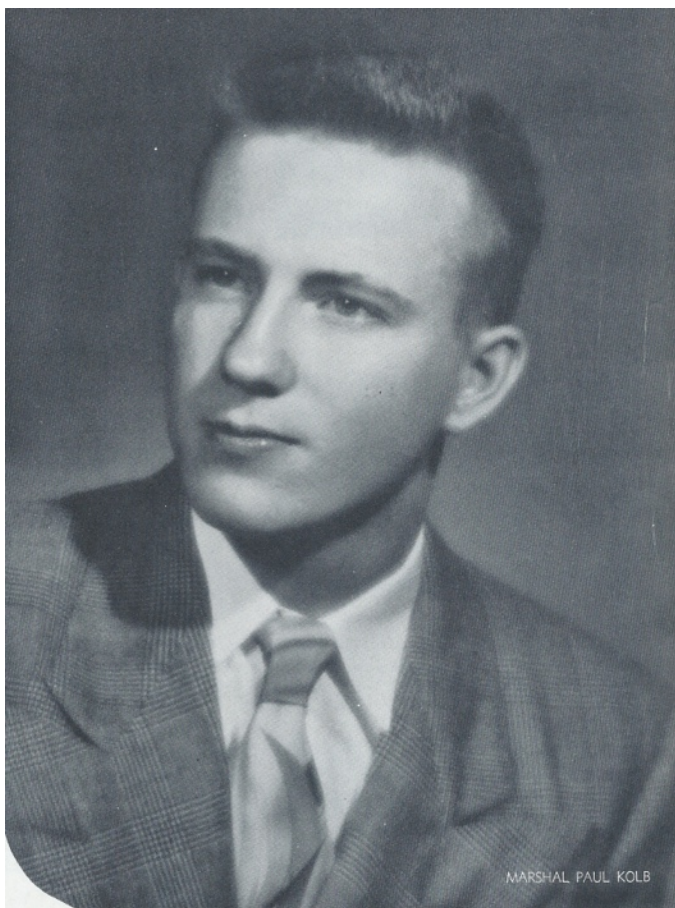

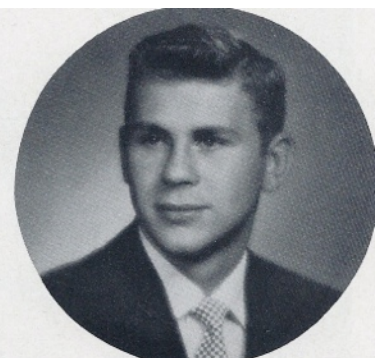

Duff Erickson was our candidate for Chief Jester of the Spinster Dance, while Mary Ann Davis reigned as Sweetheart of the year. At the Hi-Y Carnival Nancy Pennock, our junior class choice, walked off with the title of Hi-Y Queen.

1950-'51 Almost miraculously three hundred forty people have been molded into a swell group. We've had many good times during our last year. We are especially proud of our accomplishments of our Senior days. Paul Kolb and Patty Masters reigned over OLD festivities with Pat Rustad, Mary Davis, Bonnie Beck, Veloy Hawkey, Jim Wylie, Jack Hoffmann, Courtney Anderson, and Ken Anderson as attendants. Jack Hoffmann, our Senior Class president, did a good job as the toastmaster of the Senior Banquet. Our other class officers are Jim Wylie, vice-president, Paul Kolb, secretary, and Ron Greenslate, treasurer. Marylyn Kirkpatrick vied for Hi-Y Queen. Our attractive candidate for Sweetheart was Frances Line. We are proud of our class as individuals, but most of all as a group.

When you mention AMC (American Motors Corporation) most motor enthusiasts usually don't gasp and wait for you to start talking about their favorite car manufacturer. The Peterson family would be the exception. Roger, Vonda and their son Mike are die-hard AMC enthusiasts. To understand their enthusiasm for the brand, you have to understand the history of the company.

Through its 34-year existence, AMC created some of the most memorable, inspirational, and exciting cars the world has ever seen. American Motors was formed in 1954 from the merger of Hudson Motors and Nash-Kelvinator. The deal was the largest corporate merger up to that point - worth \$197,793,366 - but was just one phase of a planned megamerger of Hudson, Nash, Studebaker, and Packard. In an effort to stay competitive, American Motors produced a wide range of products during the 1960s, and added innovations long before the "Big Three" introduced them. The continuing quest "in the business world's toughest race - the grinding contest against the Big Three automobile makers" also meant annual styling changes requiring large expenditures. From 1968, AMC became known for the Javelin and AMX muscle cars. AMC purchased Kaiser's Jeep utility vehicle operations in 1970 to complement their existing passenger car business. From 1980, AMC partnered with France's Renault to help finance their manufacturing operations, obtain much-needed capital, and source subcompact vehicles. By 1983, Renault had controlling interest in AMC. Production was discontinued for all AMC cars except the all-wheel-drive Eagles, to focus on promoting the Alliance subcompact. Renault sold AMC to Chrysler. The AMC and Renault brands were then discontinued in America. The Jeep/Eagle division of Chrysler Corporation was formed from the remains of AMC after Chrysler's 1987 buyout. The Jeep and Eagle vehicles were marketed primarily by former AMC dealers. American Motors was forced to constantly innovate for 33 years until Chrysler absorbed it in 1987.

This may seem like an unusual letter to the editor. I would like to enlist the help of your vast O&B readership in helping me locate family members and or loved ones of Navy pilot COMMANDER VINCENT DUNCAN MONROE, missing in action during the Vietnam War. I wore a bracelet in his honor for years, vowing to do so until he returned home or his remains were found and returned to his family.

Over some 40 plus years I have periodically tried to locate his family so I may return the bracelet to them but as of yet I've not been successful. These facts I do know about him:

Born: 7-1-1938 Chicago, IL

Last home of record: Oaklyn, NJ

Married - Caucasian - Protestant

He was assigned to the USS Kitty Hawk. On May 18, 1968 he, along with Commander Charles James, Jr flew a reconnaissance mission over North Vietnam. Somewhere off the coastline their plane was shot down by anti-aircraft fire. Two parachutes were observed and emergency radio beepers were heard but no contact could be established. Radio Hanoi broadcast the capture of two American pilots on that date in the general area that they went down.

In 1973, 591 American POWs were released from Vietnam. James was amongst them, Monroe was not. Sometime in late 1978, due to the efforts of Congressman "Sonny" Montgomery of Arizona, Monroe's remains were released and returned to American soil where he was buried with full military honors at Arlington National Cemetery.

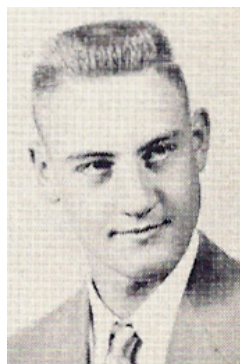
