

Bob Burns USD Fullback '40 & '41 Written by Jack Phillips '54

Stu Whitney, the very talented sports writer for the Argus Leader referred to Bob Burns as the "Legend of the Fall" and then wrote that "Bob Burns survived the Great Depression and descended from a dark sky over Normandy. He fought steamy summer boxing battles and became the most fascinating force in the history of South Dakota football."

Burns competed in football, basketball and track at Sioux City Central High School where he graduated in 1938. He then entered the University of South Dakota where he played basketball and football. Before graduating in 1942 he led the North Central Conference in scoring in 1940 as a 170 pound single-wing fullback.

By the time Burns graduated from USD WWII was going strong and he joined the U. S. Marine Corps. He was a member of the famed and distinguished 101st Airborne Division that parachuted in darkness on June 6, 1944 behind the German lines

Normandy Beach assault began. 868 members of the 101st were killed and thousands more were injured in the fighting that followed that D-Day landing.

General Eisenhower had predicted that the airborne troops would sustain 75 percent

casualties.

was over only 7 men and 1 officer were left.

Burns would say latter that, "Our job was to jump in & destroy the German coastal guns to help the D-Day landing force establish a beach-head. We were going to try to destroy them any way we could - with hand grenades or concussion grenades. We didn't have much to fight with, just rifles & knives. It was pitch dark and I'll tell you, it was no feast."

The 101st survivors then made another famous jump into Holland on Sept. 7, 1944 that was the start of the march in which Germany surrendered. For his bravery and leadership in France and Holland, Burns was awarded

Burn's boxing career begin as a result of him selling peanuts at police exhibitions. He was a tough fighter, the same as he was tough in everything he ever did during his lifetime. He won Sioux City's Golden Glove's championship and that took him to compete in national boxing tournaments in Chicago & Madison Square Garden.

When Burns was once asked what his most memorable moment was, his answer was, "Fighting Joe Louis I guess." During the war Heavyweight Boxing Champion of the World, Joe Louis, made a USO exhibition boxing tour to the 101st Airborne Division in Great Britain where Burns was Since Burns was stationed. the division heavyweight champion he was the chosen one to fight Louis.

Burns said later, "It was an exhibition, so there was no winner or loser, but he just messed around with me. But it was quite a thrill, boxing in front of some 20,000 soldiers - probably the most memorable boxing experience I've ever had - unless you count Madison Square Garden."

On Dec. 1, 1945 Bob married his college sweetheart, LaVerne Drabek and they eventually had 5 children. Finally in 1947 he entered his long time career goal of coaching when he was hired as football, basketball and track coach at Yankton High School where he had 2 winning football seasons. In 1949 Burns became the head coach of Washington High School in Sioux Falls where he stayed for 7 seasons, 6 of them winning seasons. His first season at WHS finished with a 4-5 record but then **Burns' Coaching Record**

Burns' teams only lost 4 more games over the next 6 years. During the years 1950 to 1954 WHS boasted a 37-game unbeaten streak.

Burns was always an extremely colorful, loquacious and popular figure in the South Dakota sports world. That popularity was well deserved, but it has endured simply because he knew how to produce winning football teams

and to do it in his own brilliant and flamboyant way.

In my opinion one of the boldest and most courageous moves Coach Burns ever made was when he withdrew the WHS football program from the Eastern South Dakota Conference following the 1952 football season.

It has been written that his 1953 team was his "Masterpiece". I am proud to say that I was a senior on that team and I will always have nothing but total admiration & love for our great coach. And, I should add that I have never known any of my teammates that didn't share my deep affection for him. I feel it was such an honor to have played for Coach Burns.

Coach Burns did so much for South Dakota football it is impossible here to even begin to touch on his many, many accomplishments that earned him so many honors and accolades.

Perhaps one of the most meaningful honors Burns ever received and the one that most likely touched him the deepest was when the Governor of SD and the Mayor of Sioux Falls proclaimed November 21, 1981, as "Bob Burns Day" in the state of South Dakota and the city of Sioux Falls.

I was so honored to be part of the over 350 Burns' former players and friends that were on hand that Saturday evening in Sioux Falls to roast and toast our beloved coach.

Knowing that Coach Burns had never had the opportunity to return to France and Holland since he parachuted into those countries with the 101st Airborne Division in 1944, he and his wife, Laverne were given a trip to those European countries by his former players from Yankton High School, Washington High School, Augustana College, The University of South Dakota and O'Gorman High School.







graduation from Washington High, Bob attended The University of Nebraska from 1953 to 1957. Nebraska, a member of the "Big 8", Big 12" and now the "Big 10 Conference has always been a major national football power.

Perhaps one of the best measures of a man is what his fellow man thinks of him and in athletics the highest measure of what your teammates think of you is when they elect you captain of the team. Well Bob Berguin was not only elected captain of his 1952 WHS football team, he was again elected captain by his Nebraska football teammates 4 years later.

Being elected captain means your teammates not only like you, they also trust and respect you. As long as I have known Bob Berguin he has always been held in the highest esteem by his peers and has always deserved to be the elected captain of his teams.

Because of Bob's toughness and natural athletic ability, he has always excelled in football. When he was just a freshman at WHS, Coach Bob Burns recognized his potential and moved him up from the freshman team to play on the B-Squad team in his freshman year. He then played on the varsity for 3 years, contributing greatly to the success of those early Burns' teams.

Berguin's WHS football years were exceptional with a




Photo and story on Bob in the Lincoln, NE, *Lincoln Journal* on Oct. 12. 1954 when Bob was iust a sophomore.

South Dakotan Is a Cornhusker Hit

Robert Dean Berguin, No. 1 center for the Huskers, missed out on a boy's normal home life. His father died when Bob was 9.

"So I had to work around filling stations and do odd jobs while going to school." He spoke casually, making no pitch for sympathy.

Bob's father ran the commissary in the State Penitentiary at Sioux Falls, S. D., Bob's home town.

It's a town with strong sports traditions and usually has top teams in both football and basket ball.

Bob attended Washington High and made the all-state team. He also played in the high school all-star game in Memphis, Tenn., something which entitles him to be known as a prepster All-America.

On the same Washington team were Duane Leach and Jack Neuroth, who played for South Dakota U. against the Huskers a few weeks ago.

In street clothes the Husker athlete looks to be on the small side. There's a compactness to his 190 pounds.

He has slightly curly hair and Norwegian coloration. He's half German by descent.

Berguin is a senior in the College of Business Administration.

He already has made longrange plans for himself, and they are particularized. He expects to get into sales work and from there make his bid for success with a good corporation.

With that in mind he'll devote more time later to

studying companies.

"Right now it's a case of bearing down in football and in classes," he analyzed. "And the two of them leave me little time for anything

"I'll be reporting at Quantico, Va., after graduation in June. That takes care of two years and I can't plan anything until that is taken care

Berguin will get a Marine lieutenant commission as a

result of his student officer training.

Marriage, he says, will have to wait its turn in his schedule.

Berguin played single wing in high school. Like any center, he appreciates the switch to the T.

"You get to hold your head up and don't have to worry about a forearm across the cheekbone right after snapping the ball. Makes it easier to concentrate on blocking assignments, too."

When there's time for fun, Berguin goes pheasant hunting. His father took him out first, one of his treasured memories.

In addition to being named to the first team of the South Dakota All-State Football Team at the conclusion of his senior season in 1952, Bob was also named to the National All-American Team and was invited to play in the National High School All-Star game in Memphis, Tenn.

After graduating from Nebraska, Bob, spent 23 vears in The Marine Corps. 2 years in active duty and 20 years in the reserve. retired at the rank of Lt. Colonel.

After his active duty with the Marine Corps Bob worked 30 years for Lion Apparel, an "image apparel" company with home offices in Dayton, OH. Bob retired in 2002.




