(We went different ways in WHS due to interests etc.) However, we managed to get in trouble at the Pettigrew museum together in 3rd, got kicked out of music class in 5th for making squeaking noises in the chorus, etc. Sam could sing well, and had a lead in the Mikado we did in one of the higher grades.

I went to his house to play at times and thought his home was a mansion on Pendar Lane (I think.) I won't forget his pointer dog Blue. Sam told me that the dog liked to have people blow in its face; I did and the dog about snapped my Funny, in one of those early visits, I recall his sister Stephanie

complaining loudly to their dad about something. He turned to her and said quiet down or you won't get your new bra. I didn't know what that was then!

I remember as a senior when he told me he was applying to UoM in Ann Arbor, I thought it was the end of the earth. Then I ended up living in Michigan for 30 years and to AA many times. We saw each other sometimes during college breaks, but he told me he was going into the Air Force. I was sad when I heard he was shot down and missing for sometime. My mother went to a service when it was confirmed he was killed.

I don know if Sam's family has his 3rd grade picture (Mrs. Simon at Mark Twain. He's in the first seat of the 2nd row and I'm in the last seat of the 1st row. We had good times those early years!
