

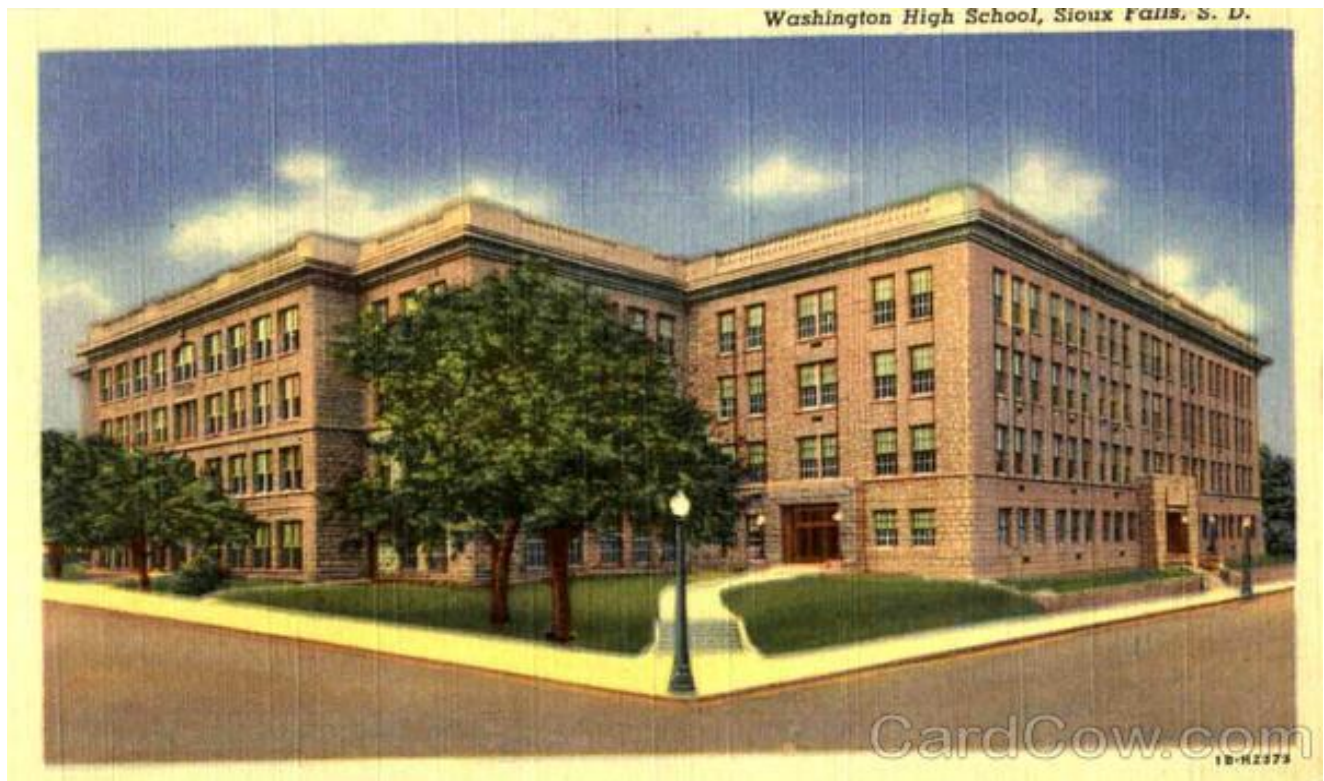

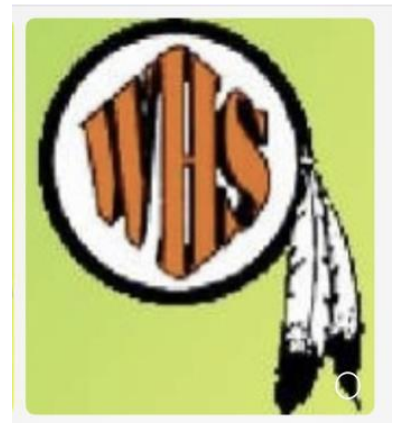

## Looking Back at only Three Lifetimes

Being one of the '59 most junior members of the WHS 1950s classes that Jack Phillips addressed when first publishing the Washington High School Orange & Black Alumni Newsletter, I reflect now on much has transpired in my lifetime since my birth in 1941, 83 years ago.

I remember when I thought 30 was old. And when I was 30, I thought 60 was old. When I was 60, I never considered the fact that I'd live to be 83. Just recently I was flirting with a young lady (late teens) at the checkout counter at Home Depot and asked her if she had ever considered dating an older man. She replied, "Older – Yes. Ancient – No."

So, I've recently put an 83-year-old lifetime in perspective. I'm not speaking of a generation considered to be 20 to 30 years, but an actual lifetime. If, instead of being born in 1941, I would have, instead, reached my current age of 83 that year, and with simple arithmetic, that means I would have been born in 1858 – just one lifetime before.

While Sioux Falls was founded in 1856, in 1858 Sioux Falls was a true frontier outpost. The Yankton Treaty was signed that same year between the United States Government and the Yankton Sioux Tribe (Western Dakota), that ceded most of eastern South Dakota (11 million acres) to the U.S. Government.

Construction of Washington High School began in 1904 and completed in 1908 at which time; I would already have been 50 years old.

In just that one previous 83-year lifetime, I would have witnessed slavery, heard President Lincoln's Gettysburg address, witnessed the Civil War and probably served in World War I. No gasoline-operated vehicles until around 1900 – only real horsepower, and no telephone service until then either. No TV available until the 1950s, no Internet nor computers. In 1858, Minnesota becomes the 32nd U.S. state followed by Oregon admitted as the 33<sup>rd</sup> U.S. state in 1859 and the first oil well was drilled in Pennsylvania.

In the 1850's, children were expected to take on chores around the house as soon as they could help. Small children, even as young as 4 or 5 years old, had chores such as keeping the fire going, fetching water, and caring for livestock. Even families who lived in towns often owned chickens or horses.

Now, going back only one additional 83-year lifespan, I would have been born in 1775. In 1775, South Dakota was a region largely unexplored by European colonists and predominantly inhabited by various Native American tribes collectively known as the Sioux including the Lakota, Dakota, and Nakota people.

Most colonists lived in rural areas, with agriculture being the primary occupation. Family life was central, with children often working alongside their parents from a young age. Technology was limited, and travel was slow, taking days or even weeks to cover distances that would take hours today. In 1775, the average life expectancy in the United States was around 35-40 years.

In 1775, the year I would have been born only three of my lifespans ago, The American Revolutionary War began on the East Coast with events such as the Battle of Lexington and Concord, and the appointment of George Washington as commander of the Continental Army. The war ended in 1783. Interesting to note that each of my three consecutive 83-year lifetimes began with a war – Revolutionary War, Civil War and World War II.

My mind and memories are still clear enough to recall most significant events in my life all the way from childhood in the early 1940s to present day. Three lifespans only triples that period of time yet seems far out of reach and incomprehensible except as defined in history books. I am grateful for the gift of life in spite of the mistakes I've made.

Looking forward, if I were born this current year, again with the same 83-year lifespan, I would become a senior living in the year 2108. I can't even begin to imagine what life will be like.

Good afternoon Mrs. Phillips,

I am so glad to hear that Ms. Marlys received my card! The exact scholarship name: Washington High School Alumni Scholarship offered through the Sioux Falls Area Community Foundation. The Washington High School Alumni scholarship gave me \$2,500, and the Sioux Falls Area Community Foundation gave me \$12,250 in total between that scholarship and three others. These scholarships covered the remaining debts for my cost of attendance at Augustana University. Without all the funds from my generous donors, I likely would not have attended college at all. The yearly price for my university is about double my single mom's salary, and I have 3 younger siblings in my household that will attend college within the next 5 years.

I became a TRIO Talent Search student after my school discovered I was a homeless unaccompanied youth. That school program allowed me to explore careers and colleges, and also prepared me for the ACT and scholarship applications. All of the students involved in TRIO are first-generation university students, meaning they don't usually have a parent beside them to tell them step-by-step what they need to do to get an education. There are so many students like myself that are so academically gifted but just don't possess the knowledge or resources to make use of their blessings. Yet, they remain the best candidates due to the empathy, compassion, and resilience they've gained from all the adversities they've faced. On the behalf of every college student that has worked 10 times as hard to get where they are today, we are forever appreciative of the donors that recognize that we are just as deserving of a good life.

## WASHINGTON PAVILION UPDATE

*Completion is  
Scheduled for 1998.*

The Sioux Falls City Council has voted unanimously on July 9th to increase the spending ceiling for the Washington Pavilion from \$25.1 million to \$29 million. This will allow supporters to raise an additional \$2.1 million through private funding. The Washington Pavilion will include a 1900-seat Performing Arts Center (our old auditorium), Civic Fine Arts Center, Discovery Science Center, Omni Theater and a small theater.
