



I firmly believe that Bob was one of the most outstanding football players to ever take the field for WHS. The University of Nebraska obviously shared that opinion since Bob was a starter at center through out his entire college career at Nebraska.

Bob was married for 58 years to Peggy Mathers, his college sweetheart . They

Long live old, brick fortress of Warriors

I'll never forget the day the sleek, chartered bus rolled down Chamberlain's main street.

We were hanging out in front of the Rainbow Cafe. It must have been the fall of 1957 or 1958, because talk centered on the Milwaukee Braves and the World Series.

Conversation ended in midsentence when the bus hissed to a stop at the curb. The door popped open, and a giant stepped out.

We stared, open-mouthed, as the first was followed by a second, even bigger, giant, then a third and then what seemed like an endless stream of monsters, menacing in black jackets with orange trim. They milled around on the sidewalk, glancing disinterestedly up and down the street. Then they swaggered, one or two at a time, into the cafe. The last giant gave the front door a careless fling as he walked through, and it slapped shut behind him.

Almost immediately, the door opened again and Ron Ballou slipped out. He hurried over and said, "Geez, did you see those guys? That's Sioux Falls Washington. They're going to Rapid City for a football game. They're going to eat here."

Well, we couldn't have been more awestruck if the Chicago Bears team bus had pulled into town. I mean, this was Washington High School.

We stood around the sidewalk, trying to see through the cafe windows without appearing to be interested. It wasn't difficult to imagine what a bunch of Washington High football players would do to a guy if they didn't like him staring.

A lot of people who grew up in Sioux Falls and attended Washington High have expressed feelings of sadness at the planned abandonment of the old school building. They hate to see the tradition and the memories disappear.

So do a lot of people who didn't grow up in Sioux Falls and who didn't go to Washington High. The shadow of that huge, old brick fortress stretched across all of South Dakota in the 1950s and 1960s. The school was unique.

Sure, there was Watertown and Yankton, Aberdeen and Mitchell, even Rapid City. Nonewere Sioux Falls Washington.

On shopping trips or medical visits to Sioux Falls, farm kids would sit in the back seats of the car and marvel at the school building that covered a city block, shake inside trying to imagine themselves in the crush of students pouring out the front door at the end of the class day.

Warrior athletes were feared, hated, respected. They won every track championship for more than a decade in one stretch and consistently fielded football teams that trampled the best three states could offer. In the 1950s, just the sight of the Warriors thundering onto the gridiron in evil black and orange was enough to make the official scorer ring up a touchdown and extra point.

As a freshman at the state track meet, I was bumped and knocked off the track briefly on the second lap of the 880-yard run. To this day I'm proud it was Dick Callahan of Washington who did it.

At the Corn Palace Relays my senior year, I brought the baton in first in the opening, 440-yard leg of the medley. We couldn't hold the lead. We may have finished out of a medal. Even so, the guys gathered around afterward and said, "Man, Woost, you smoked Washington's quartermiler."

No higher praise could have been given.

Years later, in 1968 or 1969, I focused a camera at the ceiling of a fourth-floor classroom in Washington High, trying to take a picture for the Argus Leader to show how part of the roof had collapsed.

"We need a new school," a couple of kids said.

They're getting one, and maybe it's long overdue.

Still, I hope memories of old Washington High don't fade too quickly. They belong to us all.

Dear Jack

Per usual, I was very glad to receive your latest edition of The Alumni ORANGE & BLACK Newsletter. I read them religiously and commend you on the time you must expend in producing it for all the class of the 50's. I'm also elated you decided to continue producing them instead of retiring.

I was also pleased when I read your reply to Terry Bradley ('57) who contributed to the Patron's Club, and I immediately decided to send a contribution to ou on behalf of my Gjere siblings; brother, Glenn, and sister's Mary and Helen who where WHS graduates. The three of them graduated prior to our 1954 graduation date. I think Mary graduated about a year or so before my class, but I don't recall the years Glenn and Helen graduated. Both Glenn and Helen are now deceased. Mary will be 90 years old in May, and lives just across the alley from my house.

Sister Helen and our mother, Hilda, and I were very happy to come back to South Dakota in 2000 to live when our home (and about 80 other surrounding properties) in our suburb of Milwaukee (WI) were bought by our suburb/county due to severe flooding of the Menominee River. Twice in 15 months, we had 5 feet of water in the basement. Since the affected area homes and businesses would be demolished in an effort to mitigate the flooding problem we all experienced, we had to find a new home. Instead of relocating in the Milwaukee area, we decided to move back here to South Dakota to be closer to Glenn and Mary: we decided on Viborg to be near Mary.

In memory of my brother Glenn and sisters Helen and Mary, I'm enclosing a check for \$250.00 to help to defray the costs you must experience in the production of the newsletter.

I frequently check our 1954 yearbook and reminisce about our high school years and classmates; it's SAD so many of our classmates are now deceased. I'll be 85 in a few months

and am in pretty good health; just getting older and stiffer. Mother passed away at 96 ½, so I might have her genes...... I hope!

I do miss Milwaukee where I was employed by the Milwaukee Public Schools; 21 years as a junior high/middle school teacher and other local school responsibilities not involved in classroom teaching. I was then appointed as a Middle School Learning Coordinator for my last 11 years of my 32 years of employment with MPS. My years with MPS were very fulfilling and rewarding in all respects. I was issued a Life License as a teacher, and a Life License as Supervisor/Coordinator/Director of Instruction (K-12) from the State of Wisconsin. After my 32 years with the system, I was able to retire in 1991 at age 55 with full retirement benefits from the school district and state retirement system.
