

I hope you enjoy the following pictorial sampling of Vegas Christmas attractions offered by hotels, casinos and public parks all over town.

















A Memorial To Bob Scott '53

Robert Wallace Scott ("Scotty" and of course "Bob" to many of his friends) was in Mr. Sidlow's homeroom. Before that, Bob was one of my classmates at Hawthorne, but when I inquired among a few of them what had happened to Bob, no one seemed to know. I sought information about him and other long-lost friends on the Internet and was ultimately contacted by his granddaughter, Danielle Scott, who in turn put me in contact with Bob's widow, Shirley Scott. Shirley related the following:

"I can't tell you for sure what Bob did right after he graduated, as I didn't meet him until he came home from his tour of duty in the Marine Corps. He returned to Lincoln, NE, as his mother had been transferred there from her work in Sioux Falls. He had only been in Lincoln a few months when we started seeing each other. He decided he wanted to get married and attend the U. of Nebraska. This is how our life together started. We married, had one child before he entered college and had two more children while he was in college. He graduated from the School of Accounting and started his career as an accountant with the Veteran's Adm. Hospital. In order to advance in his career, he had to transfer each time he was promoted to a higher position in the Fiscal Office of the VA. Eight years after he graduated from college, we had one more child. It is no wonder no one was able to track him down, as we moved every two years until he reached the position of Chief Fiscal Officer in the Northampton V.A. in Northampton, MA. We moved to Chesterfield, a little town 12 mile from the VA and have lived here for 40 years.

Bob passed away in 2004 after a hard battle with cancer. We were blessed to have had many happy years with our four children, 13 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren."

With help from Bob's daughter and Hawthorne classmates Dale Paulson ('53) and Ray Dickey ('53), I can piece together a few further details. Bob's father had deserted the family, so Bob and his four (or five?) siblings were raised by his mother. Bob started work at age 11 at Dickey's diner (on 6th Street) and was probably still working there until he joined the Marines. Bob was very concerned that his own children be raised in an intact family. His widow and granddaughter clearly have fond memories of him. Bob lived directly across N. Spring Avenue from Hawthorne. He was elected our class President in 8A. At WHS Bob went out for track. He was a no-show for photographs in the '53 Warrior Annual, but he appears in the '51 Sidlow homeroom photo. I attach a photo of him and his classmates in the 8th grade at Hawthorne.

Editors Note: The following is Jim's response to my insistence that he write a story on himself for the O&B. Thanks Jim.


Hi Jack,

I am responding with some information abut my life after WHS. Other than coming to our 50 reunion I have had little contact with other WHS grads since 1956 other than **Dale Peterson** '56, who lives in our community. A

few years ago **Pat Jorgenson Palagi** '56, arranged a mini reunion of our classmates who live in the northwest and that was my only other contact and it was a fun get together.

I am not quite sure as to what you had in mind but here it goes.

After graduation from WHS I went to the University of Nebraska and graduated with a degree with a major in zoology and a minor in philosophy. I met my future wife, Lynn Wright, there the however she was two years younger than I. I moved to Chicago where I graduated from Northwestern University medical School. Lynn and I managed to stay in contact long distance which



there she designed the emergency medical symbol which is on every ambulance in the U. S. now and in most countries worldwide.

"Callison: Washington Hall of Distinction list surprises city native"

Inductee wrote brief that helped end ban on interracial marriage

When you mostly grow up in Sioux Falls, you graduate from high school here and you've been back for almost 20 years, you sometimes think you know the résumé of everyone who has ever lived here.

Well, I don't, and that was made clear recently when I read about the nine people being inducted into the Washington High School Hall of Distinction.

Then I started tracking down a few of them and connected with William Zabel, a New York City lawyer, whose firm represents "many of the wealthiest individuals in the country on tax planning, succession planning, charitable giving, etc.," according to a brief biography.

I confess: I thought, "Ho-hum," when I read that. Another lawyer.

Zabel, however, charmed in our brief phone call. I caught him about six minutes before he had to leave for an appointment. Just before he had to hang up, I asked, "What has been your proudest moment since graduating from high school?"

His reply: "The proudest one is writing the winning brief in Loving v. Virginia, against the law that prohibited interracial marriage in 1967. They were a very nice couple."

Stunned, I put the receiver down. Zabel — Washington High School Class of 1954 — was part of history; he helped stop state miscegenation laws. And he knew the couple brave enough to be the test case.

A reporter's joke, probably funny only to us, is, "If your mother tells you she loves you, check it out." So I Googled Zabel and Loving v. Virginia. Sure enough, Zabel is right there in the middle of stories about the couple, the case and the U.S. Supreme Court.

There's more. According to one web entry, "he was the lead lawyer in Weiss v. Gardner, where the Supreme Court held that a loyalty oath then required by Medicare was unconstitutional. Later, he signed the brief in Palmore v. Sidoti, in which the Supreme Court held that a white woman could not be stripped of custody of her child because she married an African American."

Some of the impetus for his work in human rights might have come from growing up in Sioux Falls. "I was always proud of coming from (Sioux Falls) even though I'm not sure exactly why," Zabel said. "It's a very nonbigoted city, no anti-black, no anti-Semitism that I ever saw."

Zabel's late brother, Sheldon Zabel, Class of 1959, also is being inducted in the 2013 Hall of Distinction. They're not the only brother act this year. Paul Light and Mark Light, twin brothers who graduated in 1971, also were inducted this year.

Joining them are the late Arthur Huseboe, '49; Robert Miller, '57; the late Carl Davidson, '26; Robert Gabel, '33; Bruce Blake, '49; and Jan Amundson, '64.

Amundson retired as a senior vice president and general counsel of the National Association of Manufacturers in Washington, D.C.

"I was the only woman general counsel of a trade association in the United States," says Amundson, who now lives in Alexandria, Va. "I think that was an accomplishment. When I started law school (at the University of South Dakota), our class was the largest class of women ever. There were six of us. So I was doing some of the 'firsts.'"

Amundson graduated from Washington shortly before the sole public high school in Sioux Falls was joined by Lincoln High School.

"It was a great, big, oversized school, so you got to know so many different people," she says. "We were in classes with people from all the junior highs."

Amundson keeps several pieces of art depicting the old high school on a wall in her home. She was the third generation of her family to attend Washington.

She returns to Sioux Falls often to visit family, and when she does, she makes a nostalgic drive down South Minnesota Avenue where The Barrell drive-in restaurant once stood. "It played such a big part in all our lives," she says.

Like Zabel, she remembers English teacher Annie Kleinsasser as an influence. They both cite Lorraine Norman, now of Beresford, as affecting their lives. Zabel also points to the late Barney Kramer, a theater teacher.

"I went to some supposedly established schools like Harvard and Princeton, but I learned from Kramer and Norman," Zabel says.

Amundson learned biology from Robert Dolan of Beresford and says he was kind to sophomores, "the lowest of the low" in the days of three-year high schools.


One memory involving Kleinsasser occurred the day John Kennedy was assassinated.

"She said, 'This is all very sad, but we must all continue to learn,' " Amundson recalls. "It got us back focused and away from being scared."

O&B Editor's footnote: Of the nine inductees this year into the WHS Hall of Distinction, three of them are from our decade of the fifties. Having known all of them, I certainly concur that they are all truly deserving of this outstanding honor.



Greetings Don from Texas,

I was reading your note in the in the O & B about Emerson grade school. Then I read further that you lived on S. West Ave.... across the street from Emerson. I too lived on S West Avenue (517). My parents bought that house in 1941 when when I was 4 years old. My mother lived there until she moved into assisted living in 2001.

I suppose you know that Emerson School is no longer there. I graduated from there in 1950. You were trying to recall teachers at Emerson. Do you remember Janie May Johnson. She

would have been the librarian. I got to know her when my brother, Virgil Carlson (WHS 1950) started dating Joann Stenberg (WHS 1950). Janie May lived with the Stenbergs after Dr. Stenberg died in 1943.

Do you remember Ms. Hultz. She taught math. As I recall, she was the one that wore those horn rim glasses, she was very very tall, her hair was twisted up into a knot on the back of her head and she was ever so stern. Whenever someone would act up in her class, she'd open the middle

drawer of her desk and pull out her magic wand....(a rubber hose) which she would threaten to use if the trouble maker didn't straighten up. I recall that Jack Phillips was in her class with me ??? or was it that Jack was the trouble maker??? Smile No. Jack couldn't have been a trouble maker. He was the favorite student that transferred in from Oklahoma and said "yes, mamm" and "no sir" when spoken to.

I graduated from WHS in 1954 and then went to Minneapolis to go to college. I majored in music education at Minnepolis School of Music. From there I went to Florida and taught in a college for three years. Then on to Dallas, TX as church music and youth leader. Went to Wichita, KA to finish my masters work and continued teaching in other Assembly of God schools for three more years.

In 1971, I changed careers and started driving bus for Trailways Bus Lines. After 18 years, I entered a mid-managment position scheduling 400 drivers for the local bus company. (Dallas Area Rapid Transit)

I retired in 2001 hoping to enjoy life with my family. That was short lived as my wife was diagnosed with liver cancer and passed away in 2005.

I now live alone in Mesquite, TX in the Dallas area.
