The 1963 Dick Clark's "Caravan of Stars" Tour started

the first week of November. I had received the contract from Clark's manager in October with the names of the acts that were on the show. They wanted me to have the band size at seven

musicians, but I talked them into six because that made it possible for us to get to New York City in my station


wagon pulling a trailer. The contract called for me to be paid \$1,200.00 per week plus all expenses paid, which was okay money in those days. I had purchased the hit records recorded by the acts on the show and we had a lot of the rehearsal work done before we even left town.


I remember that morning we were getting ready to leave like it was yesterday. The guys were all excited but I was nervous and I made a comment to my wife Carole that I was wondering how we were going to be able to take on such an undertaking. She said "Myron, you go through this every time you go on tour and it always turns out great and it will this time too."



Here we were, 21-year-old kids leaving home for five weeks. We stopped at McDonalds on East 8th Street for a 15 cent hamburger and a malt and we were on our way on the old two-lane Highway 16 with no interstate in those days until we got to Wisconsin. We drove non-stop and as we got to within 100 miles of New York City it seemed like we were in the city already. We drove through the Tunnel into Manhattan to check into the New York Sheraton and all I could hear were taxi horns, probably honking at us with our South Dakota license plates showing.

We checked in, unloaded everything and I drove my station wagon and trailer to a Harlem parking ramp to be stored for the five weeks. *The Ronettes*, who were on the show, lived there and had arranged this for me. I was in new and strange territory and as I paid the attendant and left, I took one last look at my new station wagon thinking I may never see it again. From then on we would be traveling in one of





Dick Clark's two custom busses.


The next morning, we boarded the busses for a short trip across the bridge to Teaneck, New Jersey where we rehearsed for five hours to get ready for our first show there that evening. The band was on Bus #1 with Dick Clark sitting up front across from the bus driver. There was a total of 58 people on the busses including Clark's road manager who was a former drill sergeant in the Army and he was still playing the part.

The band consisted of myself, Stu Perry (drums), Curt Powell (guitar), Jerry Haacke (bass), and Fred Scott and Joel Shapiro (saxophones). Only the two horn players read music and the rest of us read chord charts. As band leader, I was responsible for putting it all together and I had a notebook with each acts list of songs they would be performing.

After running through around 50 songs that day, it was 5:00 pm and time to go to the dressing room to get

ready for a 6:00 pm show. I was a basket case and wanted to sneak out and hop a plane back to safe little Sioux Falls, South Dakota. As I walked into a noisy dressing room with all the guys on the show laughing and having a great time, the first person to walk over to me was Dick Clark. He shook my hand and I'm sure he could sense that I was a little nervous and I still remember what he told me. He said that he had heard from Bobby Vee how good the band was. He also said that he had been listening as we rehearsed and not to worry about any little mistakes that may happen the first show because the people in the audience won't even notice them. He also said that by the third or fourth day things will all come together and will be tight. Was he ever right! On the fourth day in Utica, New York, I stood on the stage listening to the band and boy did it sound good.

There were 15 acts on this show. The show would start out with us playing a song and then I would announce "From ABC Television and American Bandstand, Dick Clark". Dick would then introduce each act and they would each do four or five songs. They all had hit records: *Brian Highland, Linda Scott, Jimmy Clanton, Paul and Paula, Little Eva, The Ronettes, The*

After playing Teaneck, New Jersey, we headed south playing a show each night. We would pack up and drive anywhere from 100 to 500 miles to the next town, get some sleep and do it all over again.

There are a lot of stories to tell and I'll do that next time. One of them will be what we ran into when we arrived in Dallas, Texas around 10:00 am on November 22, 1963.

Gary Hartenhoff started his art career in Sioux Falls, striping cars in high school. He moved on to painting holiday greetings in the windows of Phillips 66 gas stations and taking every art class in school.

Next, Hartenhoff became a sign painter at a furniture store, decorating the windows and helping with the displays, eventually owning his own sign company here, Hart Signs and Graphics, from 1962 to 1989.

In 1976, he started three years of study in stained glass. In 1981, he took more painting classes and drawing workshops and ultimately moved out west to perfect his art.

He spent 18 years in southern California learning everything he could about oil painting and honing related skills such as stretching canvases, framing and matting.

Hartenhoff, 79, has returned to Sioux Falls, where his art journey continues with a variety of artistic endeavors.

For example, commissioned by the Rock County Arts Council in Luverne, Minn., Hartenhoff conceived and painted a mural on the side of the Habilitative Services building, 123 W. Main St., in 2011. It features 11 postcard-type images of landmarks and citizens in the community. "It involved fine art skills but also sign-painting skills, which are almost obsolete these days," Hartenhoff said in an interview with the Argus Leader at the time.

He also completed an image of a buffalo called "This Land Was my Land" for the clinic at the Ellsworth Air Force Base in western South Dakota: seven of his paintings hang at the Sanford Heart Hospital in Sioux Falls; and a couple of paintings are in the Avera Cancer Institute.

Hartenhoff shares his philosophy of painting. **QUESTION:** Describe your art and media.

ANSWER: I do representational art, the type of art you can look at and recognize what it is. I prefer using oil — it's the most forgiving media. You can paint over and over it, and you can change it more than any other paint, and it's the strongest.

It's the most lucrative type of painting; it's more valuable in consumers' eyes. Watercolors and acrylics seem to be worth less.

Q: What draws you to painting?

A: The pure pleasure of it. It's the same as playing music. I paint to express myself. It's the opportunity to express myself, but I also do it for the audience.

Q: What is your favorite subject?

A: Landscapes and still lifes are my favorite things to paint. The still lifes especially, you control the placement and background and have all the time to paint them.

I also do plein-air painting. It draws you to the landscape.

Q: What are your most popular paintings?

A: The best-selling paintings are cowboy art,
Native American art and horse art for
collectors, but I like to do landscapes.

In the summer, I work in the garage or outside almost daily; in the winter time, I work in the basement.

I like to paint outdoors in the early morning or late afternoon. The north light is the best light for artists. You can utilize the shadows to express yourself.

We do have beautiful country back here. Even the winter is pretty.





Robert Henrich Dolan 83, of Beresford, SD died Friday October 24th with family by his side. Visitation will be Tuesday, October 28th from 4-7pm with family present at 5pm. A prayer service will follow at 7pm. Mass of Christian Burial Wednesday, October 29th at 2 pm. Both services will be held at St Teresa's Catholic Church in Beresford, SD. Burial will follow at St John's Cemetery.

Robert Henrich Dolan was born November 12th, 1930 on the Dolan farm in Beresford, SD to Joseph and Mary Ellen (Nellie Henrich) Dolan. He grew up and graduated from Beresford High School in 1949. He graduated from the University of South Dakota with a teaching degree in Biology and Zoology. He earned his Masters of Administration in 1967. He spent his first two years of teaching in Elk Point, SD. On August 2nd, 1958, he married Sally Coddington. He then began his long-time teaching career in the Sioux Falls Public Schools (Whittier Junior High, Washington and Roosevelt High Schools). The majority of his teaching years were spent at WHS. His career in education spanned over 50 years, influencing thousands of students. He officially retired in 2006. Bob was a hands-on teacher. He brought the farm to the city (from hatching pheasant and quail eggs to farrowing a sow). He was the Science Department Chair for many years and was awarded the John W. Harris Teacher of the year in 1998. In addition to teaching, and his love for animals, he continued to farm, raising hogs, cattle, and chickens.

Bob was a lifelong member of St Teresa's Catholic Church. He was a fourth degree Knight and had served as Grand Knight. He was currently President of St John's Cemetery board. He was a member of the Beresford Lions for over 50 years and held many offices. He was very involved in the Lion's Eye Bank. He was a strong advocate for the success and growth of Beresford. His vision of a golf course and housing development became a reality. He enjoyed bowling, golf, bridge club and anything involving family.

Bob had a love for the New York Yankees, listening to them on the radio as a young boy. He also had a love for Notre Dame. Most important to him was his faith and his family. Through the years, he never missed any of his children's numerous activities and so enjoyed watching his grandchildren. He was the best husband, dad, grandpa and great-grandpa a family could ask for.

He is survived by his wife Sally of 56 years and their 6 children: David (Kim), Rapid City; JK (Karen), Beresford; Ann (Darnell) Nelson, Sioux Falls; Ellen (Tom) Manning, Casper, WY; Deb (Dan) Bergland, Beresford; Sarah (Brad) Antonson, Beresford. 18 Grandchildren: Ashley (Josh) Kauffman, Matthew (Cara) Dolan, Stephen Dolan; Justin Dolan, Katelynn Dolan; DJ (Andrea) Nelson, Meghan (Fiancee Reagan Clemensen), Benjamin Nelson; Joe Manning, Mandy (Jeff) Hurley, Catherine Koch, Thomas Manning, Mary Ellen Manning; Hunter Bergland, Alana Bergland; Nick Antonson, Maddie Antonson, Jack Antonson. Six great grand children: Ella and Addison Koch, Jeffrey and Allison Hurley, Mya and Jameson Nelson and two great grandchildren on the way.
