MYRON LEE AND THE CADDIES "THE EARLY YEARS" by Myron Lee Wachendorf WHS Class of 1959

In 1956, when I was a freshman at Washington High School,

1958 I had a little three piece combo with myself on piano, **Greg Hall '58** on drums (also a WHS student) and a string bass player. One of the places we played was on Saturday morning for the KELO television show *Tomorrows Stars* featuring Gwen Gustad. The music we played was the old standards and with Rock N Roll sweeping the nation I knew I had to make a change if I was to have any chance of making a living in the

exciting new things were happening with music as Rock and Roll was born the year before when the movie Blackboard Jungle came out and the opening song was Rock Around the Clock. My Dad was a piano player and had a band in the 1940s and by the time I was five years old he was teaching me piano



music business. I knew exactly what I wanted to be and do. I wanted to be a Rock N Roll singer in a Rock N Roll band. Life was much simpler in those days and I went down to the Sioux Falls Music Store and bought a Silvertone guitar and

amplifier for \$150.00 hard earned paper route money.

By late 1958, the band Myron Lee and the Caddies was born with Barry Andrews '58 on sax, Dick Davies '59 on drums (both classmates), Jerry Haacke on bass, Curt Powell on lead guitar and myself on rhythm guitar and singer. I had learned to play a few a few simple chords on the guitar to get started. We had to join the musicians union in those days and I saw an ad in their monthly magazine one day from Hep Records in Minneapolis that would record two songs and supply 400 (45 RPM records) for \$400.00. I had the money saved and on a chilly November Saturday in 1958 we recorded two songs I had written: "Homicide" and "Ah C'mon Baby". We were so excited the day those records arrived by Greyhound Bus and we got busy and mailed copies to a lot of Midwest radio stations. Our Top 40 station in Sioux Falls was KIHO-1270 on the Dial and they had our record on rotation playing every half hour 24 hours a day. All of a sudden everyone who listened to that station was hearing our name within a fiftymile radius of Sioux Falls.

The phone started ringing and people wanted to book us and during the summer of 1958 we played a lot of dates at a place called *The Stardust Club* east of Sioux Falls where Washington High is now located. A lot of my under-aged classmates would sneak in to hear us. My mother had signed some kind of a legal document so my band could be in there to work since we were all

underage. The Stardust Club was a summer place so that fall I had an offer for us to play every Wednesday night for Johnny White at the Club Cabana. By now I was a senior at WHS and I wrote a song called "Rona Baby" which we recorded in Minneapolis again. This record took off in cities all over the Midwest and I was approached by a man named Jimmy Thomas, who had been in the big band business for years, who became our booking agent. I had a part-time summer job as a caddy at the Minnehaha Country Club and that is where the name "The Caddies" came from. When Jimmy became our booker, he wanted me to add the Myron Lee to it.

Since I was too young, my mother signed a five year contract with Jimmy and we were off to the races. He knew all the best spots to play and knew all the ballroom operators. In May of 1959, my senior year, we left to go on a Midwest tour and I was a credit short and never graduated from WHS. Many years later, at a class reunion, Governor George Mickelson '59, who as a classmate, presented me with an honorary high school diploma. Things happened fast and before too long we were working with many of the big names in Rock N Roll all over North America. It all started

while day dreaming in class at WHS and ended up being a 35 year career.

PRESTON E. SMITH'S '63, STORY

Jack, Here is the info on me

Preston E. Smith.... went to grade school and my freshman year of high school in Alexandria, S.D. then moved to Sioux Falls in the summer of 1960, We lived at 1911 S. Willow. I enrolled that fall as a sophomore at WSHS, and my homeroom was 218, with Mr. Lemohn as my homeroom teacher. My junior year our homeroom was changed to 226, still with Mr. Lemohn. Graduating in June of 1963. In the fall of 1963, enrolled at Northwestern College of Chiropractic in Minneapolis, Minnesota, did finish my freshman year, and that was the end of my college days. Came back to Sioux Falls in the summer of 1964, and got a job at J.C. Penney's in the

men's department, transferred to Spencer, Iowa as a Department Manager, then in the fall of 1966, was transferred to Dayton, Ohio as a buyer But in the fall of 1967, I became a Deputy Sheriff, Montgomery County, Ohio (Dayton) I have been divorced the last 25 yrs. Retired 4 yrs. ago, and came back to Sioux Falls, What a Great Town Yet!!!!

Preston's story continued in 2nd email:

I left the Sheriff's Office (SO) Oct. 25th of 1975, in good standing. AJ told me, "you will be back in law enforcement in a month."

I came back to South Dakota, got a job, and applied to the Los Angeles SO, in LA, Calif. in November, 1975. I was notified in April of 1977 to report to the courthouse downtown on Temple St. for testing on a certain day. So I flew to LA to start testing to become a LASO Officer. This test was a week-long test and tests were given every day. If you failed any part, you were notified, and didn't show up for the next test!

I took my first test along with 450 other people thinking, "Boy! I've got a chance, because they were only testing for 387 positions." Then I found out that there were another 9 testing sites going at the same time in LA with 450 at each one! Well, I made it through the entire week and was notified that I had placed 167 out of 4500. They would notify me, via letter, when the next academy would start; within 6 to 8 weeks.

So, I jetted back to Dayton, stayed with Ron Casey, my old roommate, and rode with him one night. It was the same old stuff. Plus, I had a reputation on the streets and wasn't sure I would be able to maintain it! So, I applied to General Motors (GM) in Moraine. They wanted ex-officers and I was accepted in April of 1977.

I left GM in the fall of 1992. I learned of a technology that NO ONE knew anything about in 1989, and started a company called Buckeye Radiant Barrier. Then, Clark E. Beck, PE, a Science Engineer from Wright Pat Air Force Base, called me and said he wanted to meet with me. During our meeting he told me that he was one of a few engineers in the US that had worked on the Top Secret material for NASA and the government. He congratulated me for bringing Radiant Barrier from NASA to the civilian market. I knew what this technology could do to save energy!!!

Later, NASA called me, and flew me to John C. Stennis NASA Center in Mississippi. They wanted to know how much I knew about Radiant Barriers. So, I told them what I knew about the barrier and what I planned to do with it. I wanted to help mankind!

I founded two more companies, Quantum Energy and Tech 2000, and my product was called "Energy Q." Finding Radiant Barrier took me around the world. I even spent four weeks in Russia, speaking to their engineers in Moscow!! But in all of my endeavors, I have always missed my friends from the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, and there's not a day that goes by I don't miss them and the job!!! They were Great People, Great Times!

I was featured three times in the NASA Spin-Off Book in 1992, 1995, and 1997.

I became a member of The Dayton Engineer's Club in 1991.

I was inducted into The U.S. Space Foundation Technology Hall of Fame by NASA. I was 1 of 9 inducted in 1996.

I was inducted into the Marquis Who's Who in Science and Engineering, 3rd Edition, 1996/1997.

I become one of the original members of The Board of Directors of the South Dakota Rock and Roll Music Association Hall of Fame in 2008.

I was a Board of Director's Member for "Automania". It's the largest FREE car show in the Midwest and it's in my hometown, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, 2010.





2015 ALL SCHOOL REUNION EDITORAL

I know it is over a year away, but if we are going to have a 2015 All School Reunion, time for the planning is growing short. Marlys Ahrendt Hohman '57 still needs volunteers to help organize it. I spoke to Mavis Larson Carl '55, last week and I was so pleased when she told me she had volunteered to help. But I know more volunteers are needed.

Living in Las Vegas precludes me from being an active member of the committee, so what I am about to say is just my own personal opinion and not that of anyone on the committee. The numbers from past All School Reunions have shown that the classes of the fifties have been the largest decade in attendance. Members of the forties and the sixties decades have been next in attendance numbers.

Past Reunion records also show that very few of the younger Alumni from the more recent WHS graduating classes attend at all. Many of the younger classes have not had a single member attend. Yet, past committees have had to work with the given r e s p o n s i b i l i t y of equally expending its energy and promotional resources trying to appeal and attract ALL classes. Even

though more recent All School Reunion Committees knew full well that the largest number of attendees were going to be from the fifties decade.

As a result of these attendance numbers, it has been suggested that perhaps we should just organize a reunion for the fifties and let each other decade do the same if they wish. There is some merit to this idea for logistical reasons, but I think a more realistic solution would be a sort of compromise.

My suggestion is that we, the members of the fifties decade, organize a Reunion Committee to primarily concentrate its efforts toward organizing a Reunion for the classes of the fifties, BUT **ALWAYS** making it known that every other class year and every Alumni from any class is enthusiastically welcome. This would limit the committees promotional and organizational efforts to Alumni of the fifties decade where the greatest results are realized. Not only will Alumni from the fifties decade be most likely to attend, they will also be the easiest and most economical group to reach. I say that partly because of this publication, the O&B, that already reaches a large number of them on a regular basis.

It is terribly time consuming and expensive trying to obtain up to date mailing lists for every class that ever attended WHS and then send out mailings to them. In fact it has proven impossible to obtain class lists from many classes simply because some classes no longer even maintains their class records in any updated and current fashion.

Over the past few months I have asked a lot of vou if you would like there to be another All School Reunion. Almost everyone I have spoken to said, yes, they would, and yes, they would attend. I really feel strongly that if we can just get a committee organized and make it happen it will be well attended and enjoyed. But, I fear the entire concept will soon die if more volunteers don't come forward to help put it together.

So, one more time, I ask each of you that live in the Sioux Falls area to seriously consider calling Marlys Ahrendt Hohman at 605-271-9084 and volunteering to serve on the committee. I think it will be an involvement you will enjoy and be glad you helped make it happen.

As with all editorials, your opinion, either pro or con, is eagerly sought.






Colleen Calhoun Gravelle, 73, died in Christ, Wednesday, February 12, 2014 at Naperville, IL.



Orange & Black Delivery Problems!

Over the last two months I have received a much larger than normal number of calls and emails from subscribers about not receiving the O&B. This is huge concern of mine and I assure you I am devoting a great deal of time trying to trace and solve the problem.

I have spent considerable time on the phone with GoDaddy.com, the company I use to mail each O&B mailing through. Their system provides me with reports on each one of my mailings and I can always tell if your mailing is "Bounced", "Opened", "Unopened" or if you "Unsubscribe". I don't think I have ever had any one intentionally "Unsubscribe". By accident yes, but they were immediately, "Resubscribed".

"Bounced" means that the mailing did not reach you as there was a problem, usually with the address and can usually be easily fixed.

However what seems to have been happening recently, the Go Daddy reports are saying the mailing has been sent and delivered, but it remains "Unopened". But my subscribers are saying they have not received the mailing. Go Daddy says that all they can do is deliver the mailing and if it does not show as "Bounced", or "Unsubscribed", it was in fact delivered and they can not do anything about it if your mail server has chosen for whatever reason, that they can't or won't deliver it to your computer.

I am told that every mail server has "filters" that determines if there is a problem with the mailing and then sometimes sends it to your "junk or spam box". But it seems that they also have the power to just delete it and neither you nor I never know you didn't receive it.

When I pressed Go Daddy for a solution to this problem they gave me the following suggestions. They say that there is nothing more either they nor I can do to solve the problem, it is going to require you to help solve it. Their main suggestion is for you to contact your mail server and ask them why you are not receiving mail from my email address of jack@jackmphillips.com. You should tell them that you were receiving mail from that address in the past and you know that you are still being sent emails from that address, but you are not receiving them and WHY?

A second suggestion Go Daddy made was to make sure my address of jack@jackmphillips.com is in fact entered into you "Contact List", or your "Address Book". That should tell your computer that you do wish to receive mail from that address.

Unfortunately, I don't know who all is having this problem and this mailing probably won't reach those that are having the problem. So I can only ask that you forward this explanation on to anyone that you might know is not receiving the O&B.
