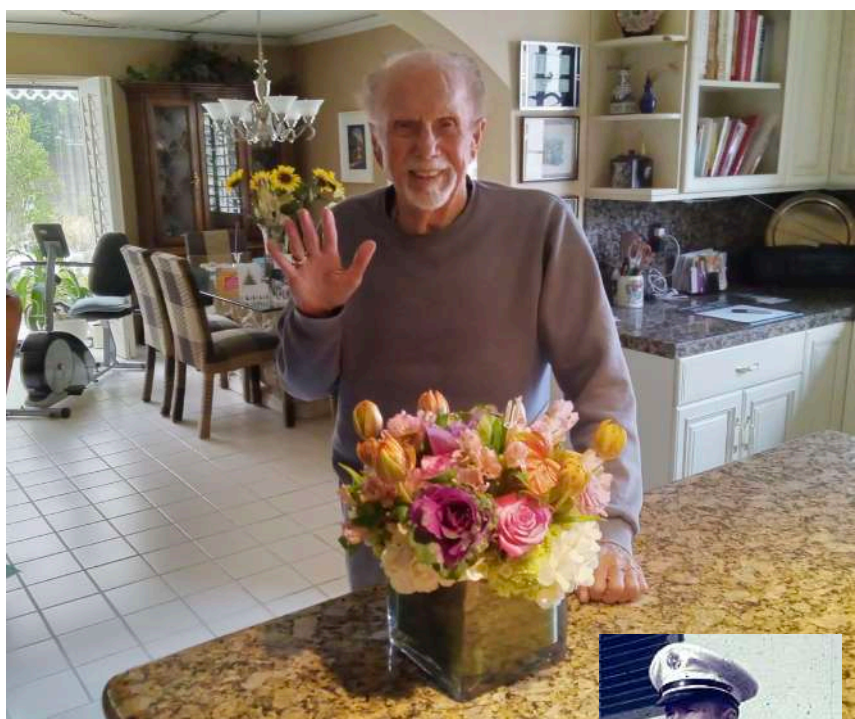
Greetings on Memorial Day 2023..... I just hung my flag up on my flag poll. Another sunny beautiful day here in the desert.

Your readers will remember the McKennan Park Band Shell. As buildings need to be maintained, it is now in progress of a restoration. Attached two pictures from 1927 and 1937. I wrote about the history of the band shell from newspaper articles that I researched. I titled it "The South side of 20 acres" I like the parts where within 1 year and two days it was completed and how the key was passed on. You can use this in your O/B if you like. Thanks for all you do. **Jim Carlson '58**



The South side of 20 Acres

In July of 1925 a band shell was urged for one of the city parks. The need was felt by musicians of Sioux Falls, and especially the Municipal Band members. They felt a band shell was a solution to help with a 50% loss of efficiency as the open music was not directed in any direction.

At the regular July 2, 1925 noon meeting of the Cosmopolitan Club a movement was started. At the meeting held at the Harry White Café [222 S Main] it was brought up, to ask all service clubs to assist in the project, and the idea would be known as a civic club project. As a band shell was needed at a city park. The matter was presented to the club by Roger Brown and explained in detail by Burton Rogers, president of the 5 year old band. At the close of the discussion, A. B. Cross, William C. Bessler and Lyle Brown were appointed to a committee to investigate the matter and report back at the next meeting. The project was accepted and approved at the meeting and efforts were put in place.

The first fund raiser was held on a Tuesday night September 1, 1925. It was a Sioux Falls band shell, movie benefit ball and held at the Coliseum. It was the opening season for movies. The local theaters, Municipal Band and the Cosmopolitan Club cooperated to make the event one of the biggest ever offered. Joe Mendenhall, local Paramount manager also assisted in the effort. Prizes were offered to those who resembled a film star. Movies were held, the Municipal band played, stunts were featured and special decorations were put up. Profits went to the fund for a band shell to be built at a city park.

Within a year and two days of the Cosmopolitan proposal \$4,000. was raised to pay for a band shell and the building was completed. The project cost the city taxpayer nothing, as the money was raised after the first event by more entertainment like the one of September 1st, expositions like "made in South Dakota" [which was called outstanding] and radio shows.

With the fund raising a success, a survey of the city parks, found the south

west corner of McKennan Park as the best area to bring the best results. Permission was granted by the Park Board to build the shell. Conrad Knutson local contractor was chosen to chair the committee, and he took over the work to build the shell. He was also the designer as well as director of the building project.

With the project proceeding on time a dedication was held on July 4, 1926, a Sunday afternoon at 3 P M. An estimated 4,000 people attended. Fred Witte, past Cosmopolitan president, under whom the funds were raised, was master of ceremonies. Witte gave the history of his club, told of its purpose and the history of the project. He then introduced the principal speaker, Dr S. S. Klyne, Pastor of the First Methodist Church in Sioux Falls. Dr Klyne praised the club for its initiative and success of the undertaking. He spoke of how it turned spare time into money to give to the public, something to enjoy in their spare time. He said it's not a monument to the club, the club is a monument to its self. He spoke of the significance of the day and the of the presentation to the public on the 150 anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Conrad Knutson was then honored for his work as designer, builder and chair of the band shell committee. Past President Witte complimented him for his fine work and called on him to give a report. After which he turned the key to the shell building over to C. C. Johnson, current club president. Johnson presented the key to Mayor Thomas McKinnen representing the city. The Mayor then turned the key over to R. B. Meldrum, chairman of the park board, who took over care and control of the band shell.

With the dedication over, a musical program was presented by the municipal band directed by Charles McClung, who stated it was the great cooperation between the band and the Cosmopolitan Club that made the project successful.

The stucco shell was built with a metal roof, dimensions 54' 6" wide, 25' 8" deep, and 36' at its highest point. Stage 34' wide and 21' 6" dep. Lights were concealed in a trough which was around the shell and reflected the light, into the curved part. Base of the building was painted green and the main part cream with white. A stone was set in the center of the front base with the following words.

Presented By Cosmopolitan Club

July 4, 1926

Assisted by the Municipal Band

Name plate donated by _____

Who donated, is unknown as the words were scrapped off.

That evening the band shell was used for a patriotic program arranged by the Sons of the American Revolution, in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.

In the early 1990s the Park Dept organized a series of meetings with people who lived near McKennan, about a number of improvements needed at the park. One of the things the neighbors feared was the city would demolish the then 69 year old band shell, they Insisted that the band shell be the first to be restored. According to the city web site ,In 1995 it was completely renovated..

The contents of the museum were sold at a public auction.

Roy Rogers told his son, if the museum ever operates at a loss, close it, and sell the contents.
He had complied.

Here is a partial listing of some of the items that were sold at auction:

Roy's 1964 Bonneville (Pontiac) sold for \$254,500. It was estimated to sell between 100 and 150 thousand dollars.

His script book from the January 14, 1953 episode of "This Is Your Life" sold for \$10,000 (EST. \$800-\$1,000).

A collection of signed baseballs (Pete Rose, Duke Snider, and other greats) sold for \$3,750.

A collection of signed bats (Yogi Berra, Enos Slaughter, Bob Feller, and others) sold for \$2,750.

Trigger's saddle and bridle sold for \$386,500.

One of many of Roy's shirts sold for \$16,250 and one of his many cowboy hats sold for \$17,500.

One set of boot spurs sold for \$10,625. (He never used a set of spurs on Trigger).

His set of dinnerware plates and silverware sold for \$11,875.

The Bible they used at the dinner table every night sold for \$8,750.

One of several of his guitars sold for \$27,500.

Nellybelle (the Jeep) sold for \$116,500.

Bullet (stuffed) sold for \$35,000 (EST. 10-15K). He was their real pet.

Dale's parade saddle, estimated to sell between 20-30K, sold for \$104,500.

One of many pairs of Roy's boots sold for \$21,250.

Trigger (stuffed) sold for \$266,500.

Do you remember the 1938 movie The Adventures of Robin Hood, with Errol Flynn and Olivia de Havilland? Well, Olivia rode Trigger in that movie. Trigger was bred on a farm co-owned by Bing Crosby.

Roy bought Trigger on a time payment plan for \$2,500.

Roy and Trigger made 188 movies together.

Trigger even outdid Bob Hope by winning an Oscar in the movie Son of Paleface in 1953.

It is extremely sad to see this era lost forever.

Despite the fact that Gene and Roy's movies, as well as those of other great characters, can be bought or rented for viewing.

Today's kids would rather spend their time playing video games.

Today it takes a very special pair of parents to raise their kids with the right values and morals.

These were the great heroes of our childhood, and they did teach us right from wrong, and how to have and show respect for each other and the animals that share this earth.

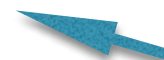

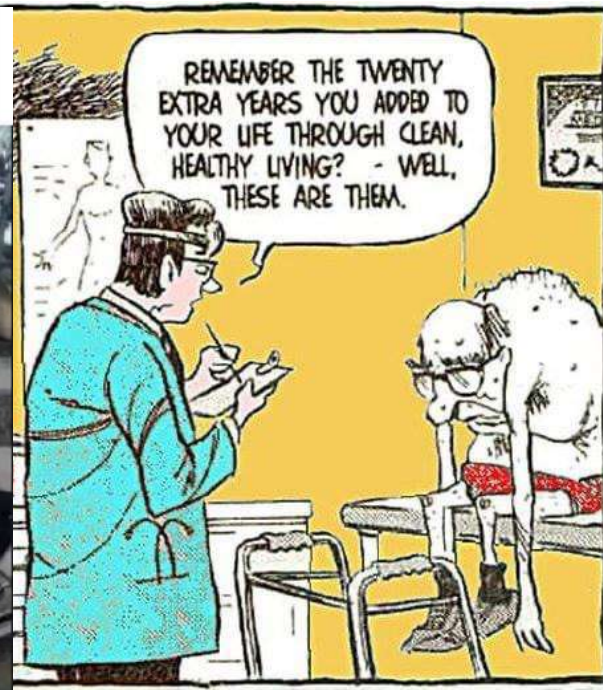
The guards are seniors at the Citadel in Charleston; there are 61 of them, and they have been doing this performance since the 1930's, all around the world.

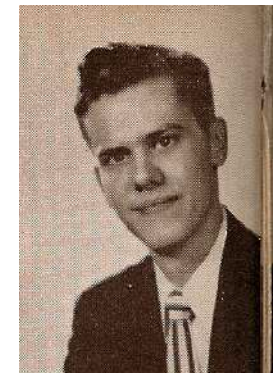

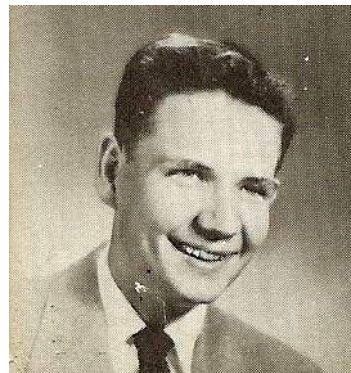

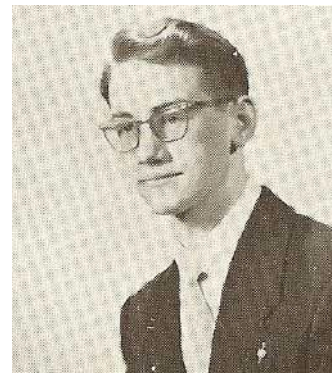

Jane, that is easy. Your '59 classmate, Mary Larson Montoya '59 just asked me the exact same question so I am just going to reprint the reply I gave her in WHS O&B Issue #2-32 that was published on April 22, 2023.

The Number of Classmates In Your Class of '59?

I am not sure any one in the whole world knows for sure the final number of graduates from any WHS class year. There is always a difference between the number of seniors pictured in our yearbooks as compared with the number listed in each years "Commencement Program". I have very few Commencement Programs from the fifty class years in my possession and unfortunately I do not have your class of '59 Commencement Program. That means I only have the yearbook numbers to go by and there were 510 "graduating" seniors pictured in the '59 Warrior.

However, it was typical, that the Commencement Program always listed a smaller number that actually graduated than were shown in the Warrior. An example of that is my class of 1954 which had 415 graduates listed in the Commencement Program, but 434 listed in the Warrior. The reason for that is simple. Because the Warrior was put together much earlier in the year and some students just didn't complete all of the requirements for graduation by the end of the year and just did not qualify for graduation by school year's end.

But I doubt that even the Commencement number is the correct final number. I have also found that there was an additional unknown number of students that would satisfy their graduation requirements in summer school and are then considered members of their graduating class. I hope this come close to answering your question.

I will write more on this subject for the next full O&B Newsletter.

Below is MORE INFORMATION GATHERED AFTER SENDING MARY THE ABOVE EMAIL.

Another interesting number for class sizes is that the number of freshmen always far outnumbered the number of graduating seniors. For example your class of '59 had 653 freshmen pictured in the Warrior Yearbook when they entered WHS in 1956, but only 510 were pictured in the 1959 Warrior.

Here is the number of seniors listed in each yearbook for each class of the '50's decade. These numbers will also give you an idea of the growth of Sioux Falls from 1950 through 1959.

1950 - #426; 1951 - #376; 1952 - #379; 1953 - #504; 1954 - #434 1955 - #421; 1956 - #481; 1957 - #473; 1958 - #492; 1959 - #510

To finish the Sioux Falls' high school enrollment picture, there are now 3 private and 4 public high schools in Sioux Falls. The Sioux Falls School District now serves nearly 24,000 students. The district has 23 elementary schools, 6 middle schools and 4 high schools.

What is the oldest high school in Sioux Falls? Construction of Washington High School began in 1904, after Central School in Sioux Falls was outgrown. Upon completion in 1908, it was renamed from "Sioux Falls High School" to Washington High School. Three hundred twenty-eight high school students enrolled into the new building on February 14, 1908.
