Hello, Jack

As you know, in 2001, I retired as Chief Justice of the South Dakota Supreme Court. Recently, in going through my files, I came upon 2 photos that reflect 2 truly memorable, but drastically different, occasions that occurred during my career: one was from a very happy and joy-filled day and the other from a truly horrible one. I have attached the photos to this email message.

On January 8, 1991, I had the great honor

and pleasure of administering the oath of office to my friend, Governor George S. Mickelson (WHS '59) for his second

term in office. With him in the photo is his wife, Linda McCahren Mickelson (WHS'59).

Certainly, all of us definitely recall that horrible afternoon in April, 1993, when we learned that Governor Mickelson died in the tragic plane crash in lowa. Following a night filled with grief and a total lack of sleep and consulting with other justices and government leaders, the next day I administered the gubernatorial oath of office to Lt. Gov.Walter Dale Miller. It was a day filled with sadness and tears.

I served in the South Dakota judiciary for nearly 31 years. From 1971 - 1986, I was a circuit judge in Pierre. I was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1986 and was selected Chief Justice in 1990, where I remained until my retirement in 2001. My judicial years were filled with memories of innumerable cases and occasions; some were pleasant, some not. But nothing compares to the emotions that return to me by looking at these photos.

George Mickelson was an outstanding and highly respected governor, who was devoted to his family and to the state he loved. As Chief Justice I had the pleasure of associating and participating with George in many state events, both formal and ceremonial. I was proud of him and I treasured his friendship. South Dakota is definitely a better place because of him and his lovely, devoted wife, Linda. Everyone,

Editor's Addendum: I am so very happy and honored to finally have Chief Justice Robert A. Miller's wonderful story to publish. I first asked Bob to submit a story on himself and his honorable and distinguished judicial career on May 6, 2010, over three years ago. Both Bob and I are products of Emerson Grade School and then we knew each other after WHS at USD so I have known Bob for almost 70 years now and I could not be more proud to know him and to be able to call him a friend.. He truly deserves the distinguished career he made for himself.

As is typical of Bob's modesty it took over 3 years for me to get the most impressive story above from him about his career. If I may, I would like to share some more of what I know and have learned about Bob.

After graduating from USD Law School in 1963, Bob moved to Pierre as an Assistant Attorney General. There he met, Shirlee Schlim, who was Gov. Gubbrud's secretary. Shirlee was from Howard, SD and they were married in 1964,

In 1965 Bob entered private law practice in Philip, SD, but then in 1971, the then SD Governor, Frank Farrar, appointed him as a circuit judge. As Bob said in his story, he was then appointed to the SD

Supreme Court in 1986 where he served until his retirement in 2001. Most impressively, Bob served as the Cheif Justice of the SD Supreme Court for his last 11 years on the bench. In 1998 President Clinton appointed him to the Board of Directors of the State Justice Institute in Washington, DC. Following Senate confirmation he chaired that Board until 2012.

#### Editor's Addendum on Robert Miller continued:

In searching the Internet on Bob, I discovered that following retirement he chaired the SD Constitutional Revision Commission, the Supreme Court's Special Committee on Judicial Campaign Intervention, and the Supreme Court's Special Committee to Study Cameras in the Trial Courts. He also served as a member of the South Dakota Criminal Code Revision Commission. In addition to periodic temporary assignments on the South Dakota Supreme Court and in the South Dakota Circuit Courts, he is an ADR neutral in various forums, including as a AAA arbitrator. He is a Fellow of the W.O. Farber Center for Civic Leadership at the University of South Dakota.

Bob and Shirlee still reside in Pierre and have 5 children and 7 grandchildren. In his retirement, Bob enjoys hunting, playing golf and wood working, but he continues to take special assignments on the circuit and supreme courts as well as some private mediations and arbitrations. Bob tells me that he is blessed with good health which allows he and Shirlee to continue traveling which they both love.

### "Traditions: Multi-sport star Fred Hecker powered Warriors"

Many years before Dusty Coleman or Nate Gerry set modern standards for multisport success in Sioux Falls, Fred Hecker was casting the mold. The 1957 Washington High School alum, who died of cancer in 2006, mixed toughness and talent to become one of the greatest all-around athletes in South Dakota history.

"He believed he could do anything, and as a result he did just about everything," says John Simko, a close friend who played alongside Hecker in several sports at Washington and football at Augustana College. "We've all heard those sports cliches like ferocious competitor, never say die and refuse to lose. Well, put all those together, and you'd have half the measure of Fred's capacity. He was the kind of guy that everybody wanted on their team."

Hecker did his best to oblige, earning 11 letters at Washington in football, basketball, track and golf. By soaring in those four sports, he helped define an era in which the Warriors were an Upper Midwest prep sports powerhouse.

The son of a former Purdue football standout, Hecker was a bruising fullback and three-time all-state pick under legendary coach Bob Burns. As part of a talented class that also included Simko and quarterback Jim Luce, Hecker led the Warriors to a 23-2 record from 1954-56.

Hecker story continued.

He accounted for 95 points as a 6-foot-1, 175-pound junior, and as a senior he made All-America on an undefeated powerhouse despite breaking his collarbone and missing five games.

Of course, as a four-sport athlete, Hecker was just getting started:

- In basketball, he helped the Warriors claim state titles as a sophomore and junior. As a senior, he was named All-American as the Warriors finished 21-3 and fell in the state finals to Belle Fourche.
- In track and field, Hecker was a major part of three state team titles while fueling a mile relay squad that dominated South Dakota competition.
- In golf, Hecker led the Warriors to the 1956 state team title as a junior, earning medalist honors with rounds of 68 and 73.

"If you talk to guys of my era, nobody would argue his pre-eminence as an athlete," says 1962 Washington grad Terry Comstock, now a local golf professional. "You're talking about a guy who would compete in the shot put, and then head over to play in the state golf tournament and win it. Football was his sport, but he was a tough competitor in just about everything."

Hecker played college football at Northwestern under Ara Parseghian before transferring to Augustana to join his old coach, Burns, and former teammates Simko and Luce. Though slow to regain the superiority of his prep years, Hecker helped Augustana win its first and only North Central Conference football title in 1959.

He graduated in 1963 and made his career in the Air Force, retiring as a full colonel in 1988. He served as a consultant for a San Diego technology firm after that, but a stroke in 1992 led to a doctor's edict to "play lots of golf." Hecker took him seriously.

Determined to make the Senior Tour, he chased down mini-tours and qualifiers with the same spark and spunk he showed as a tough-nosed fullback at Howard Wood Field.

Hecker was vindicated somewhat in 1996, when he qualified for the U.S. Senior Open in Beechwood, Ohio. With typical confidence, he announced his intention to win before shooting a pair of 83s to miss the cut.

A tougher battle emerged a few years ago, when Hecker was diagnosed with prostate cancer after doctors found a tumor in his bladder. The cancer later spread to his bones, but Hecker still made it back to South Dakota and insisted on going to the golf course.

"He died exactly the way he played sports – he believed he was going to beat it," says Simko, a federal judge who first met Hecker when they were fourth-graders at Longfellow Elementary. "It was one more thing he was sure he could do – and in a way he did it. He survived a lot longer than doctors thought that he would."

In 2002, Hecker was inducted into the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame – joining his friend Simko and sealing his status as one of the state's most accomplished athletes.



### **Old Mark Twain Elementary To Be Demolished**

A central Sioux Falls elementary school planned to open in 2015 borrows a floor plan from two newer schools, but from the street it will look a lot like the school it's replacing.

The Sioux Falls School District plans to demolish Mark Twain Elementary in summer 2015, just as construction wraps on a new school at the south end of the same site. The new two-story school at Dakota Avenue and 28th Street, which will be named near the end of this year, will take students from both Mark Twain and Longfellow, which also closes after the 2014-15 school year.



Jefferson Elementary also closes that summer, with most of those students probably transferred to an expanded Robert Frost.







"Justy", as he was affectionately called by his friends, was an outstanding athlete all four years at WHS in football, basketball and track.



Justin L. Berger, 91, died Saturday, August 31, 2013 at the Sanford USD Medical Center in Sioux Falls, SD.

A visitation will begin at 12:00 pm Tuesday, September 3, 2013, at Miller Funeral Home, 507 S. Main Ave., with the family present from 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm. Burial will be 11:00 am Wednesday, September 4, 2013, at Woodlawn Cemetery with a 1:00 pm Memorial Service at

Hope Lutheran Church.

Justin L. Berger, the son of Harvey and Verna (Haroldson) Berger was born July 22, 1922, in Sioux Falls, SD. He graduated from Washington High School in 1941 and went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Business from the University of Nebraska. Justin enlisted in the Army Air Corps on September 23, 1942, and entered aviation cadet pilot training in February of 1943. He was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant (fighter pilot) in 1944, and served as an instructor in P-40 and P-38 fighters.

On April 20, 1944, Justin was united in marriage with Patricia "Patty" Myhra at First Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls, SD. Justin served in the Air Force Reserve from December of 1945 through September of 1947 as a pilot. He joined the South Dakota Air National Guard on September 8, 1947, and served as a fighter pilot in the 175th Fighter Squadron. Justin was also an original member of General Joe Foss's acrobatic team known as the "Red Devils".

Justin was recalled to active duty with the South Dakota Air National Guard on March 1, 1951, and served as a flight leader until being released from the unit on November 30, 1952. He was promoted to Captain on June 18, 1952, and then to Major in July of 1959, while assigned as Commander of the 175th Fighter Squadron. Justin assumed command of the 114th Fighter Group (redesignated 114th Tactical Fighter Group in 1970) on August 1, 1966, and was promoted to full Colonel August 14, 1967. He was assigned as Assistant Adjutant General for Air, and promoted to Brigadier General May 29, 1980.

Justin was a command pilot with 11,000 military flying hours. He has flown the P-51, P-40, P-38, B-25, F-94, T-6, F-80, F-89, F-100, F-102, A-7, T-28, T-29, T-33, C-45, C-47, C-54, C-131, and U-3 planes.

Throughout his career, Justin had earned the following Decorations and Awards: Air Force Commendation Medal, Combat Readiness Medal with four Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters, Army Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Air Force Longevity Service Award with one Silver and three Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters, Armed Forces Reserve Medal with two Hour Glass Devices.

Justin was a charter member of Hope Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls. He was also a member of the American Legion, El Riad Shrine, YMCA, Air Force Association (State and National), National Guard Officer's Association, and the Sioux Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Grateful for having shared his life are his wife, Patricia of Sioux Falls; one daughter, Rebecca "Becky" Ellwein of Saline, MI; one grandson, Aaron Justin "AJ" (Jaime) Ellwein of Ann Arbor, MI; cousin, Ronnie (Janet) Haroldson of Rembrandt, IA; two sisters-in-law, Elizabeth Galindo of Escondido, CA, Marcie (General William C.) Norris of Niceville, FL; and a host of other relatives and friends. He was preceded in death by his parents, and one sister, Patricia.

In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that memorials be directed to the Family Volunteer Group for the South Dakota Air National Guard or Memory Care at Touchmark.
