Bob and his wife Shirlee, who was raised in Howard, SD, have been married for 59 years, You editor has had the true pleasure of knowing Bob since 1947 and we attended Emerson grade schools together. Even though Bob was three years younger than I, we somehow become good friends and have remained so through WHS and then through Business School at the University of SD. There have been many periods

since our school years that we had no contact at all, but due to my immense respect and fondness of Bob I have always tried to follow his professional and distinguished career which has only increased my deep respect for him.

Bob first subscribed to the O&B in early 2010 and has been a staunch supporter ever since. I now want to thank him for his second Patron financial contribution, this one for a generous \$200.00.

I always want to publish a story on each Patron when they make donation to the O&B and Bob was certainly no exception but when I wrote him to check the correctness of some of my information he strongly objected to me running a story on him. He said everyone knows enough about him and convinced me that he really preferred I not run the story I had prepared. With the same respect I always show to all of my Patrons I agreed, but Bob I hope you don't object to me fulfilling what I always feel is my journalistic obligation to my readers to at least briefly bring them up to date on you. After graduating from USD Law School in 1963, Bob moved to Pierre as an Assistant Attorney General. He met Shirlee, who was Gov. Gubbrud's secretary, and they were married in 1964. In 1965 he went into private law practice in Philip. Then, in 1971, Governor Farrar appointed Bob to a circuit judge and he and Shirlee moved to Pierre (from 1975 -1986 he was the Presiding(Chief) Judge of the Circuit.) He was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1986 and served there until 2001 when he retired. His last 11 years on the Supreme Court he was the Chief Justice.

The only other thing I could get out of Bob was that he and Shirlee have 5 children, at last report at least 5 grandchildren and that he still keeps very busy. He did tell me that in short, "he has been blessed

with a successful career, a wonderful family and good health". Of course I was so happy to hear that, I have always known Bob to be such a kind, gentle, compassionate and intelligent person and I feel he truly deserves all of the happiness and success life has brought him.

The radio network expanded from 3 stations to thousands.

Your parents were suddenly free from the confines of the depression and the war, and they threw themselves into working hard to make a living for their families.

You weren't neglected, but you weren't today's all-consuming family focus.

They were glad you played by yourselves.

They were busy discovering the postwar world.

You entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where you were welcomed, enjoyed yourselves.

World War 2 was over and the cold war, terrorism, global warming, and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life.


Only your generation can remember a time after WW2 when our world was secure and full of bright promise and plenty.


You grew up at the best possible time, a time when the world was getting better.



SEPTEMBER, 1872


So Carl I am curious how long you have lived in Fortuna and what brought you there in the first place. It is truly a beautiful place to live.



Highway To Beautiful Fortuna. CA area.





Living most of his life in Sioux Falls, Sweetman and his family have always found St. Patrick's Day as a funfilled celebration. SIOUX FALLS — A long-time Sioux Falls businessman has been named grand marshal of the city's annual St. Patrick's Day Parade.



The St. Patrick's Day Parade Extravaganza Committee on Wednesday, Feb. 1, announced Dick Sweetman as the 2023 grand marshal of the annual gathering.

Sweetman, 86, is part of a family long active in the Sioux Falls business scene. For nearly four decades, he served as head of Sweetman Construction, before transitioning to Terin Construction Co. for another 13 years. In addition to founding the Ellis and Eastern Railroads, he serves as president of Spencer Quarries and ith his wife, Kathy, gifted the Washington Pavilion with a planetarium, to open this year.

Sweetman's heritage can be traced back 10 generations to southeastern Ireland, with his grandfather settling roughly 85 miles east of Sioux Falls, in Minnesota, in the late-1800s. Growing up near downtown Sioux Falls, and attending Notre Dame, Sweetman even became an Irish citizen in 2001, and maintains close contact with relatives that still live there.

Living most of his life in Sioux Falls, Sweetman and his family have always found St. Patrick's Day as a funfilled celebration.

Sweetman's heritage can be traced back 10 generations to southeastern Ireland, with his grandfather settling roughly 85 miles east of Sioux Falls, in Minnesota, in the late-1800s. This year's St. Patrick's Day parade has been moved up a day to the Saturday following St. Patrick's Day, on March 18, instead of Sunday, when it has traditionally been held.

The traditional painting of the shamrock will take place at 11 a.m. on March 18, in front of Mrs. Murphy's Irish Gifts, with staging for the parade beginning at 12:30 p.m. on Main and Dakota avenues between 11th and 13th streets.

#### **Any Time Now???**

The Arctic Ocean is warming up, icebergs are growing scarcer and in some places the seals are finding the water too hot according to a report to the Commerce Department yesterday from Consulate at Bergen, Norway. Reports from fishermen, seal hunters and explorers all point to a radical change in climate conditions and hitherto unheard-of temperatures in the Arctic zone. Exploration expeditions report that scarcely any ice has been met as far north as 81 degrees 29 minutes. Soundings to a depth of 3,100 meters showed the gulf stream still very warm.

Great masses of ice have been replaced by moraines of earth and stones, the report continued, while at many points well known glaciers have entirely disappeared.

Very few seals and no white fish are found in the eastern Arctic, while vast shoals of herring and smelts which have never before ventured so far north, are being encountered in the old seal fishing grounds.

Within a few years it is predicted that due to the ice melt the sea will rise and make most coastal cities uninhabitable.




