Roger Hunt, abortion foe, longtime lawmaker, dies at 80

**Roger Hunt '55,** a Brandon lawyer who was at the epicenter of South Dakota's abortion wars during the last 25 years, died Friday night.

Hunt, 80, died following complications related to a routine surgery. He was the second high-profile South

Hunt served 20 years in the South Dakota House of Representatives, including one term in 1999 to 2000 as

speaker of the House. Hunt was also one of five candidates who vied for the Republican nomination for Congress in 2002, a contest won by Gov. Bill Janklow.



Though he was firmly opposed to abortion – sponsoring a state law that banned the procedure – and steadfast in his socially conservative beliefs, Hunt was also known as a gentleman and negotiator.

Secretary of State Shantel Krebs, who served as Hunt's district mate in the House from 2005 to 2010, called Hunt an "honorable gentleman" who worked hard at understanding every piece of legislation. While everyone knew where he stood on issues, Hunt was always respectful of people who disagreed with him. "Everything he did was with such great respect," Krebs said. "It was a sheer joy to sit with him and serve with him as my district-mate in the Legislature," she added.

Born Feb. 23, 1938, Hunt grew up in a working-class neighborhood in Sioux Falls, where he graduated from Washington High School. His father ran a watch-repair business for 30 years and his mother worked in the J.C. Penny stockroom.

He became the first person in his family to go to college, graduating from Augustana College. He then earned a law degree from the University of South Dakota School of Law.

Following law school, Hunt joined the U.S. Navy, serving 22 years on active duty in the Judge Advocate General's Corps. His career saw him stationed on both coasts, Great Britain and the Nationalist Republic of China. The military, he said in a 2002 interview, was a good reflection for his own conservative beliefs.

"The military is still very conservative in the U.S. It promotes good values and self-confidence," he said.

After retiring from the Navy, Hunt returned to South Dakota and opened a law office in Brandon. He won his first term in the South Dakota Legislature in the 1990 election. Term limits forced him out of office in 2000.

Following his failed bid for U.S. House, Hunt returned to the Legislature in 2005.

Throughout his time in the Legislature, Hunt promoted socially conservative causes. He sponsored bills repealing video lottery, defining and banning obscenity, banning gay marriage and mandating the teaching of sexual abstinence in schools.

He viewed the world, he said, through what was right and wrong as defined by his Evangelical Christian beliefs.

"I believe in absolutes," he said. "I don't believe in relative values. I don't believe in situational ethics. Evangelical, born-again beliefs are important to me."

It was abortion where Hunt made frequent stands, sponsoring bills that restricted the procedure, including requiring parental consent for minors and requiring doctors to report data about women seeking the procedure.

In 2006, Hunt was the prime sponsor on a bill to outlaw the procedure in a direct challenge to the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 Roe v. Wade decision. The bill had the backing of 40 other lawmakers who signed on as sponsors, including some pro-life Democrats. It passed and was signed into law by then Gov. Mike

Rounds.

Opponents of the law gathered enough signatures to refer it to the 2006 general election. During the campaign, which attracted national attention and millions of dollars in donations, Hunt used a loophole in state campaign finance law to establish a company that funneled \$750,000 to the campaign to ban abortions. The money, he said publicly, was from a donor who wanted to remain anonymous.

Then Secretary of State Chris Nelson and Attorney General Larry Long pursued Hunt for breaking campaign finance laws, arguing the company was a ballot question committee that was required to disclose its donors. The Legislature closed the Hunt loophole in its next session, and a judge in 2009 eventually dismissed the suit brought by the state, agreeing with Hunt that the laws in 2006 did not require Hunt to

disclose the identity of the donor.

By then, voters had rejected Hunt's 2006 law 56 percent to 44 percent. In 2008, pro-life advocates secured enough signatures to put a second proposal on the ballot, this one with rape and health-of-themother exemptions. If failed 55 percent to 45 percent.

In 2011, Hunt sponsored a bill that imposed a three-day waiting period for women wanting an abortion. That bill was challenged in court by Planned Parenthood, but the abortion rights group eventually dropped its challenge.

In his final term, Hunt was among a group of lawmakers who sought to overturn the South Dakota High School Activities Association policy on transgender student bathroom use. Hunt supported a law that would have required students to use bathrooms of the gender they were assigned at birth. Gov. Dennis Daugaard vetoed the measure.

Hunt narrowly lost his final bid for House by 34 votes in the 2016 election.

Hunt was married to Sharon Hunt and had three adult children.

"Roger Hunt was a gentleman and a true public servant," Gov. Dennis Daugaard said in a statement. "From his time in the United States Navy to his service in the state Legislature, he always put his country and our state first, and he always stood firmly on his convictions. Sally (Keiser "61) and I extend our sympathies to Sharon and the entire Hunt family."





The young guns may not understand the meaning of this, but you will.

The Roy Rogers Museum in Branson, MO has closed its doors forever. The contents of the museum were sold at a public auction. Roy Rogers told his son, if the museum ever operates at a loss, close it, and sell the contents. He complied.

Note the follow-on article truly the end of an era. Here is a partial listing of some of the items that were sold at auction.

Roy's 1964 Bonneville (Pontiac) sold for \$254,500. It was estimated to sell between 100 and 150 thousand dollars.

His script book from the January 14,1953 episode of This Is Your Life sold for \$10,000 (EST. \$800-\$1,000).

A collection of signed baseballs (Pete Rose, Duke Snyder, and other greats) sold for \$3,750.

A collection of signed bats (Yogi Berra, Enos Slaughter, Bob Feller, and others) sold for \$2,750.

Trigger 's saddle and bridle sold for \$386,500.

One of many of Roy's shirts sold for \$16,250 and one of his many cowboy hats sold for \$17,500.

One set of boot spurs sold for \$10,625. (He never used a set of spurs on Trigger)

A life size shooting gallery sold for \$27,500.

Various chandeliers sold from \$6,875 to \$20,000, very unique and artistic in their western style.

A signed photograph by Don Larsen taken during his perfect game in the world series against the Dodgers on Oct. 8, 1953, along with a signed baseball to Roy from Don, sold for \$2,500.

Two fabulous limited edition BB guns in their original boxes with Numerous photos of Roy, Dale, Gabby (Hayes), and Pat (Brady) sold for \$3,750.

A collection of memorabilia from his shows entertaining the troops in Vietnam sold for \$938. I never knew he was there.

His flight jacket sold for \$7,500.

His set of dinnerware plates and silverware sold for \$11,875.

The Bible they used at the dinner table every night sold for \$8,750.

One of several of his guitars sold for \$27,500.

Nellybelle (the Jeep) sold for \$116,500.

A fabulous painting of Roy, Dale, Pat, Buttermilk, Trigger, and Bullet sold for \$10,625.

One of several sets of movie posters sold for \$18,750.

A black and white photograph of Gene Autry with a touching inscription From Gene to Roy sold for \$17,500.

A Republic Productions Poster bearing many autographs of the People that played in Roy's movies sold for \$11,875.

Dale's horse, Buttermilk (whose history is very interesting) sold below the presale estimate for \$25,000. (EST. 30-40 K).

Bullet (stuffed) sold for \$35,000 (EST 10-15 K). He was their real pet.



Dale's parade saddle, estimated to sell between 20-30 K, sold for \$104,500.

One of many pairs of Roy's boots sold for \$21,250.

Trigger (stuffed) sold for \$266,500.

Do you remember the 1938 movie The Adventures of Robinhood, With Errol Flynn and Olivia de Havilland?

Well, Olivia rode Trigger in that movie.

Trigger was bred on a farm co-owned by Bing Crosby. Roy bought Trigger on a time payment plan for \$2,500.

Roy and Trigger made 188 movies together.

Trigger even outdid Bob Hope by winning an Oscar in the movie Son of Paleface in 1953.

It is extremely sad to see this era lost forever. Despite the fact that Gene and Roy's movies, as well as those of other great characters, can be bought or rented for viewing, today's kids would rather spend their time playing video games.

Today it takes a very special pair of parents to raise their kids with the right values and morals

These were the great heroes of our childhood, and they did teach us right from wrong, and how to have and show respect for each other and the animals that share this earth.

You and I were born at the right time. We were able to grow up with these great people even if we never met them.

Alan received his bachelor's degree from Sioux Falls College in 1960, his M.A. in Sociology from the University of South Dakota in 1962, and his PhD in Sociology from Washington State University in 1966. He began his teaching career at California State University, Chico in 1965, a career that would span 37 years until his retirement in 2002. Al was instrumental in the growth of the Department of Sociology and the College of Behavioral Sciences, and he served as Department Chair from 1985-1988, in addition to serving on countless faculty committees at the department, college, and university level throughout his tenure at Chico State. After retiring, he served two terms as President of the Retired Faculty Association.

Al was passionate about teaching, and he mentored and developed friendships with hundreds of graduate and undergraduate students over the years, guiding many of them to careers in teaching and public service.

A second important pillar of Al's character was dedication to family. He has two children from his first marriage to Dianne M. Anderson, Gaylelynne Ayres and Todd Jensen, and four grandchildren, Lara and Anna Ayres and Michael and Ariana Jensen; and two children from his second marriage to Sandra Jensen, Christina Jensen-Eckert and Erika Snow. Alan succumbed to a leukemia-type blood disease in 2008.


Is there going to be a all 50th class reunion or just the class of 50 and 54?

Roger and I were very good friends, thru Scouts, military, church, and business, I could not miss this service (3 hour drive from home). I had talked to his daughter about the service and if what military parts might be happening. None was planned as his burial was to be at the National Cemetery in the Black Hills of SDak. Being a member of the American Legion Honor Guard, I asked if I could play taps at the end of the service, in uniform, after a video

presentation of his life, a slide of a flag and quote of George Patton: IT IS FOOLISH

AND WRONG TO MOURN THE MEN WHO DIED. RATHER WE SHOULD THANK GOD THAT SUCH MEN LIVED.

Guests of honor were many local attorneys, state elected officials including the Governor elect Kristi Noem. "Keep the old as long as it is good; take the new as soon as it is better."






