
SIOUX FALLS IS A

Along with my Mom and Dad, I moved to Sioux Falls from Coalgate, Oklahoma in 1947. I was just entering the 6th grade and then moved away right after college but I have always considered Sioux Falls my home town and love returning as often as I can. However, since my Mom died in 1992 and my Dad in 1993 I have only returned every 3 to 5 years for WHS Reunions, but with each visit for at least the last 30 years the number of proud "WOWS" that I utter on each visit continue to increase during my loving tours of Sioux Falls.

The **SculptureWalk** is an exhibit of original outdoor sculptures displayed year-round in downtown

Sioux Falls. The sculptures are owned by the sculptors and loaned to the exhibit. From May 4, 2019 through September 30, 2019 the public voted for The People's Choice sculpture and the winning sculpture will be purchased by the City of Sioux Falls (up to \$20,000) at the end of the exhibit year.

I always give another silent WOW to the City fathers, The Sioux Empire Arts Council the Sioux Falls Chamber of Commerce, and/or the Downtown Merchants Assoc. and any one else who has had a hand in making Sioux Falls into a WOW CITY, and for the masterful job so well done. 






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The Downtown Sioux River Development is something I never envisioned would happen. Without









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ARCOFDREAMS


Installed on this historic site in 2019, the *Arc of Dreams* is dedicated to the dreamers of the past, the present, and as an inspiration to the dreamers of the future.

Crafted from 60 tons of stainless steel, rising nearly 7 stories and spanning 295 feet, the *Arc of Dreams* is the creation of South Dakota Artist Laureate. Dale Claude Lamphere.

The Arc of Dreams represents the belief in ourselves that it takes to dream big and the gap in the middle symbolizes the Leap of Faith needed to make those dreams come true. The sculpture is dedicated to the people of Sioux Falls and South Dakota to have the courage to dream even bigger for their community.

This sculpture was made possible by these donors who believe the power of public art will have a positive impact on generations to come.

Arts: In the beginning of the 21st century, Sioux Falls experienced a renaissance of cultural interest. The Sioux Empire Arts Council continues to lead in the Sioux Falls area arts scene and gives out Mayor's Awards each year in several categories for excellence demonstrated by Sioux Falls residents. [70] The Sioux Falls SculptureWalk was the first visual evidence of the renaissance and is an attraction for both visitors and resident artists, hosting over 55 sculptures.
