



In March of 2009 I received word from my WHS class of '54 that our 55th class reunion was scheduled for Sioux Falls in Sept. of that year. I have always truly enjoyed our reunions and have always looked forward to each of them with great anticipation. But at the same time I had always felt guilty that simply because I lived so far away I never had to do any of the hard work putting it together. So that year I contacted the reunion committee and told them how I felt and asked if there was something I could do to help from Las Vegas to please let me know.

They responded with a request that I try and locate some of the 107 classmates that we didn't have current addresses for. I agreed to try and started by joining some Internet "search engines" to assist my efforts. Every time I found someone on the Internet that I thought was the right missing person I would call them by phone to confirm my find.

Each one that I called that was indeed a classmate, (And there were a few that turned out to not be classmates), was always genuinely excited and happy to be "found". I would end up talking to each of the classmates for up to an hour. They had so many questions and would tell me how long it had been since they had been to Sioux Falls and without exception profusely thanked me for finding them. They all definitely wanted to be added to our class mailing list and be kept informed of future happenings.

Each one of those phone calls were both enjoyable and rewarding to me, but they were also sad and funny and all of them, without exception, interesting. I remember feeling how fortunate I was to hear all of those wonderful stories, but that it was sad that I was the only one hearing them. As a result of those many pleasurable phone calls the idea of a class newsletter developed and the first issue was published on May 1, 2009.

That first issue only went out to the 40 classmates I had in my mailbox at the time, but I was absolutely amazed at the positive response. I immediately begin receiving subscription requests from not only other members of my '54 class, but also from members of other WHS classes. By early 2010 my mailing list was made up of many WHS Alumni from throughout the fifties decade and it was then that I made the decision to try expanding the O&B's coverage to include news and stories of all 10 class years from 1950 to 1959. I am proud to say that the Alumni Version of the O&B now has well over 1,000 readers.

I am also proud to say that of those 107 missing classmates the '54 reunion committee asked me to locate, all but two were found prior to our Sept. reunion. 

After high school, Al went on to receive his bachelor's degree from Sioux Falls College in 1960, his M.A. in Sociology from the University of South Dakota in 1962, and his PhD in Sociology from Washington State University in 1966. He began his teaching career at California State University, Chico in 1965, a career that would span 37 years until his retirement in 2002. Al was instrumental in the growth of the Department of Sociology and the College of Behavioral Sciences, and he served as Department Chair from 1985-1988, in addition to serving on countless faculty committees at the department, college, and university level throughout his tenure at Chico State. After retiring, he served two terms as President of the Retired Faculty Association.

Las Vegas Tragedy

Debra and I were so moved and appreciative of how many of you wrote or called to see if we were both okay after the terrible Las Vegas tragedy on Sunday evening, Oct. 1st. Your concern meant such a great deal to both of us and we sincerely thank you. Below in red is an email I wrote to

our families early that Monday morning. Jack Phillips '54

7 am, Monday Morning, Oct. 2, 2017 Dear Family,

Just a note to let you know that both Debra and I are okay. I was at home so I was not even close to Mandalay Bay, but Debra was at work last night at The MGM Grand where she works part time. The MGM is only about a block from the "Festival Grounds" which was the target for the shooter. Mandalay Bay is on the west side of the Strip, but the MGM and the Festival Grounds are on the east side of the Strip. (The shooter was firing over the Strip into the Festival Grounds.)

Shortly after the shooting started the police locked down the entire MGM Hotel property, including the huge, "KA Theater", where Debra works. They also locked down all of the other major hotel properties on the south end of the Strip such as The Luxor, The Excalibur, The New York - New York, The Tropicana, etc. Each of these hotels have thousands of rooms so you can imagine how huge an undertaking this lock down was. The MGM Grand Hotel/Resort is the 5th largest hotel in the world and it alone has over 6,000 rooms.

Debra usually gets off work at midnight and is home by 12:45 am ,but tonight the MGM lock down did not allow anyone to enter or leave the hotel until about 2:30 am and then of course traffic was a mess. (The Strip and many of the adjacent streets remained closed for hours.) She didn't get home until after 3:30 am.

For all of you that know Debra, you know what a strong lady she is and tonight was no different. However, she was exhausted when she finally got home so she is now sleeping. She has to be at work at 10 am for, Jerry, the tax attorney she has worked for for about 25 years. So I am really glad she is now getting some sleep.

The news of this tragic event here in Las Vegas is still sinking in and the horrible fatality and injury numbers just keep rising. At the 5:45 am press conference that just ended a few minutes ago they reported that there are now over 50 dead and over 400 injured and the news media has already labeled it the "Deadliest Mass Shooting in U.S. History."

I guess it was just a matter of time before our wonderfully clean, fun and safe city joined the list of cities hit by the world's madness.

May we all pray for the victims, their families and all of the brave first responders.

Here is some other information that you may not have heard and to give you an idea of how huge and far reaching this horrible event was for Las Vegas and how many thousands and thousands of people it affected. I have now read that some 26 plus flights coming into Las Vegas', McCarran Airport had to be diverted to other cities because the LV airport landing pattern is over the Mandalay Bay and of course no planes were allowed to take off.

I was at the Mandalay Bay Hotel and the "Festival Grounds" Tuesday afternoon, two days after the shooting, and was surprised at the thousands of pedestrians and super heavy amount of traffic that were there milling around. From the reports I have heard, hundreds, or maybe thousands of people raced to the nearby MGM Grand (which is where Debra works in the show, "KA"), for safety when the shooting started. Many of them were injured and bleeding and were being carried or assisted by friends. Tuesday it was interesting to observe the large number people viewing the many blood stains that remained on the sidewalk leading to the MGM.

Here are some photos I took that you might find interesting. You can see from the last photo how close the concert was to the MGM. The white tent in the foreground is all part of the large "Festival Grounds" were the 22,000 country music fans were gathered. They were so packed in, it was like shooting fish in a barrel.

Here are the photos I took two days after the shooting.



The photo at the right shows the two windows knocked out at Mandalay Bay. A recent theory on why the shooter broke out two windows is that he broke out the right window to shoot at the Festival Grounds, and he broke out the left window because it faced more West and gave him a straight shoot at the large diesel fuel tanks at McCarran Airport. Evidence showed that he did shoot at the tanks and did penetrate at least one of them but because diesel fuel is so resistant to igniting there was thankfully no explosion.
